

VILLA FIGURING ON NEW ISSUE OF REBE CURRENCY

General in Chief Does Not Propose to Let Carranza Money Supplant His.

That Villa not only does not propose to have his various issues of money retired by the substitution of Carranza money for all the north, but that he has even gone so far as to make tentative plans for a new issue, was learned Thursday.

May What Breach. An entirely new light is thrown on one of the most important of the decisions arrived at by the Carranza mediation conference by this move. It was generally understood, and was so given out, that the Carranza money, all the new Carranza currency that he had secured was for the express purpose of putting the Carranza circulation and retiring all other issues.

Of Much Significance. Now, however, if Villa is to add to his already large issues, one of the most important settlements of the conference will be practically nullified and his return to Carranza money will mean nothing but to issue a like or larger amount to take its place. It is pointed out that the Carranza resumption of industry that is now taking place in the north, one standard currency will be absolutely necessary to carry on business, as a number of continually fluctuating issues would act as a great hardship on the business pioneers who are returning.

GEN. FUNSTON MEETS MEXICAN COMMANDER

Veracruz, Mex., July 8.—Brig. Gen. Funston today made a trip to the railroad, where he conferred briefly with Lieut. Col. Luna, commander of the Mexican federal troops. On his return the American general said nothing important had been discussed but that he had thanked Col. Luna for several recent courtesies extended to Americans, such as the return of two marines who had wandered out of the lines.

ONLY 40 FEDERALS INVOLVED IN MUTINY

Veracruz, Mex., July 8.—In the revolt of the Mexican federal troops before Veracruz only 40 men were involved, according to a statement made by Lieut. Col. Luna, of the federal forces, to Capt. Anderson, who was in command of the train at the gap.

BRITISH SUBJECT TO BE EXPELLED FROM MEXICO

George St. Clair Douglas, the British subject, who was acquitted before a "Constitutionalist" court martial at Zacatecas of the charge of arming the federal forces during the recent battle, has been ordered by governor Manuel Carlos de la Vega, of Zacatecas, to leave Mexico at once.

CANANEA STRIKERS MAY ROUT CALLES'S SOLDIERS

Naco, Ariz., July 9.—Despite the ultimatum of Col. Calles that striking miners must return to work or join the army, the strikers appear to be getting the upper hand, according to reports from the big Mexican copper camp.

ZAPATA BROTHER IN HIS WAY TO VISIT CARRANZA

Gen. Eufemio Zapata Will Be Here Tonight En Route to Monterey For Talk.

Gen. Eufemio Zapata, brother of the Marcos leader, Emiliano Zapata, is expected to arrive in El Paso at 10:30 o'clock tonight, coming here from Los Angeles on his way to Monterey, where he will confer with Carranza.

Carranza's agents here said Thursday that Emiliano had recognized the plan of Guadalupe when it was first advanced and has since remained firm in his loyalty. It is understood that the visit of his brother to Carranza is to reaffirm the support of the plan by the Zapatistas and to make a request for artillery, so that Zapata can assist in taking of Mexico City.

PESQUEIRA WIRES TO PANCHO VILLA

Compliments Him, Defends Carranza and Then Tells of Clear His Skirts of Charges. Roberto V. Pesqueira, confidential agent of Venustiano Carranza, has appealed to Pancho Villa, in a message of congratulation at the success of the mediation conference, urging that he and Carranza manfully and patriotically call for the resignations of certain intriguing politicians surrounding both leaders.

AMERICAN REFUGEES EXPOSED TO FIRING

Washington, D. C., July 8.—The 42 American and Puerto Rican refugees who were rescued at Puerto Plata June 25 by United States sailors and revenue cutter men, were exposed to the fire of both Dominican federal and Legationist, according to an official report received here today.

MEXICAN INQUIRY MEASURE QUASHED

Washington, D. C., July 8.—Acting in accordance with state department recommendations that it was unwise to agitate the Mexican question in house at this juncture, the committee today voted to report unfavorably the resolution calling for information of alleged official assistance that "Constitutionalists" might import arms from the United States by way of Cuba without interference.

JAPAN MAINTAINS STRICT NEUTRALITY

Washington, D. C., July 8.—Japan is maintaining strict neutrality in the Mexican trouble, according to a report to the navy department by Capt. Andrew, of the cruiser Maryland, on the Pacific coast. He states that Japanese merchant steamers, under contract to deliver arms to Huerta, have been ordered to stop.

ARMED STRIKERS ARE STROUDING CONSULATE

Douglas, Ariz., July 9.—Reports from Cananea state that strikers, armed with picks, axes and other weapons, daily congregated about the American consulate, and while not riotous, are ready for any trouble that may develop.

HOLMDAHL RELEASED

General Salvador Alvarado, commander of "Constitutionalist" forces in Sonora, has ordered Roberto V. Pesqueira that he has ordered the release of Emil Holmdahl, an American soldier of fortune, who has been in jail at Hermosillo since last Sunday, charged with being a spy.

SCENIC HIGHWAY TO BE BOOSTED BY THE ROTARIANS

REVISI MEXICAN POLICY MAY SOON BE ANNOUNCED

Washington, D. C., July 7.—That the Washington government would give within a few days some manifestation of the policy it intends to pursue to meet any new development in the Mexican situation was declared by President Wilson and his advisers still awaiting official information from the "Constitutionalists" attitude toward a proposed peace conference with Huerta delegates.

RUIZ REPORTS MEDIATION TO MEXICAN CONGRESS

Mexico City, Mex., July 9.—The status of the peace conference between United States and Huerta delegates was explained Wednesday by acting foreign minister Estava Ruiz in a report to the Mexican congress. He declared that the conflict between the two countries was based up with the internal conflict in Mexico "owing to the assistance and trouble between the United States to the revolutionists." The report expressed readiness on the part of the Huerta government to negotiate with the "Constitutionalists" for a new provisional government, "which would insure political peace in Mexico and make clear the president Huerta's willingness to resign, if thereby such peace could be secured."

AWAIT MORE TROOPS TO ATTACK SAN LEUIS POTOSI

Tampico, Mex., July 9.—Jesus Carranza, "Constitutionalist" commander, and staff returned here after having been by train without interruption to within 25 miles of San Luis Potosi. The last section of the railroad soon will be repaired. Gen. Carranza will remain here until the concentration of troops is more advanced, when he will return to take part in the San Luis Potosi attack.
