Carpentier May Push Fight; Has Hard Punch In His Arms

Joe Jeanette Says He Got Surprise of His Life From the French Champion, Who Fights Gunboat Smith Next Thursday Evening; Carpentier Never Stops His Rushing; Right Hook Is Dangerous.

NEW YORK, July 12.—The third of the series of championship fights stretching over a span of less than three weeks—and the one which is destined to be the best contested of the trinity—will occur in London Thursday evening, July 16. The heavyweight championship of Europe is at stake; and Georges Carpentier, the present incumbent of the title, and "Gunboat" Smith, of California and the United States navy, will trade heavy blows for 30 rounds to determine the rightful owner of the crown. The fight will take place in Dick Burke's palatial Olympia arena where Ritchie and Welsh struggled last Tuesday for the lightweight title.

The match holds out every promise of being the most spirited ever staged before a European audience. It will be a meeting between two sluggers, the type the rabid American fight "bug" fears to see in action. There is a prevalent but mistaken impression that Carpentier is simply a boxer, and that he cares nothing for heavy exchanges. Joe Jeanette, who fought Carpentier as recently as last March, is authority for the statement that the French champion is an enlarged edition of "Terrible Terry" McGovern at the zenith of his power.

Taken by surprise. In reviewing his fight with Carpentier upon his return to America, Jeanette said to the writer: "I was taken by surprise. I don't make any mistake about Carpentier being dependent upon his cleverness to win his ring battles. He is all that Terry McGovern was, and Carpentier never stops rushing and is constantly flailing his long arms at his opponent. He took me by surprise by his rushing tactics, and no one in the club was more astounded when the referee awarded the decision to me after 15 rounds of fighting. That was one time I got away with something."

Carpentier is not lacking a wallop either. This he forestallingly demonstrated to me when he sent me flat on my back in the very first round. A right hook did the trick. I saw and fought some twice its normal size. That's how hard that French boy can hit.

Smith Has Hard Job. So it looks as though Gunboat Smith

has undertaken a man sized job. The slinky "ducky" protegee is not the scamest man in the world, contrary to the general opinion. If there is a safe front vein in the person of Smith, it will be brought to the surface in this fight, for Carpentier will fight toe to toe with this supposedly deadly puncher. One or the other will surely succumb to the bombardment. If the fight goes over ten rounds, we are inclined to the belief that Smith will seek an exit from the ring to get away from this Gallic wonder.

Is Easily Discouraged. Smith, in one of his former stints south, and unless he lands his knockout punch in the early rounds, becomes easily discouraged. Carpentier is a tranquil but outside the ring, but once the padded mitt, he is a holy terror. Smith will undoubtedly go into the fray a pronounced favorite. This should make Carpentier fight all the harder. Georges, if he has any sort of retentive memory, should show some valuable additions to his fighting category. It will be remembered that the Frenchman referred the Johnson-Moran fight. Carpentier is said to have watched Johnson's work intently with a view of adopting some of the negro's methods of attack and defense. In his training Carpentier has practiced some little tricks of Johnson's and should be proficient in their execution by the time he enters the ring to fight Smith.

Champion Johnson will appear at the ring-side to take a close slant at his prospective opponent. He has already consented to fight the winner and this incentive should make the fight still more bitterly contested.

Kid Williams to Receive Test.

Kid Williams, bantamweight champion, will get his first real test since falling heir to the title when he tackles Charley Ledoux, the French bantam for 15 rounds in Los Angeles on August 15. This will be the second meeting between the pair. In their previous encounter, which both wore contenders against the crown, Williams was defeated. The fight will be a real test for both. Ledoux is a real fighter and has won some creditable battles. Williams gives Ledoux little encouragement, for he threatens again to dispose of the frag enter via the knockout route.

Brannigan Wants Return Date Believes He Can Whip Williams

NEW YORK, July 14.—The fight fans just now are clamoring for a battle between Kid Williams, bantam champion, and Patsy Brannigan, one of the top notchers in that class and a man who has been called "the little champion" because of his ability to entitle him to another chance at the title.

Brannigan, who now is under the management of Al Morgan at Newmarket, Pa., battled Williams before the Baltimore youth was champion, fought with Johnny Coulon, who has been called "the little champion" because of his ability to entitle him to another chance at the title. Brannigan is a featherweight champion. And in every one of these fights Brannigan was credited with a draw, although in each case he was from two to seven pounds lighter than his opponent.

Brannigan, who has been called "whirlwind" Brannigan because of his rushing ring tactics, has fought 250 times, has lost one decision and one points, and has never been floored. Which is some record.

Brannigan's friends always have claimed that instead of being given draws in his battles with Coulon and Williams he should have been given the decision, and that he should have fought both men.

"If Brannigan and Williams get together the fans can expect to see a real exhibition," said manager Fritz. "Both boys fight from the top of the gong until the finish, both can hit and both are skilled boxers. I think my boy Brannigan is the better of the two, and if Williams is given a match in the fall or early in the winter, I am confident that when the battle is over there'll be another bantamweight champion—and his name will be Brannigan."

Johnny took Theil to court and had him make application for permission to change his name to "Freddie Welsh." The judge granted it, and Alexander Theil at once changed his name to Al McCoy.

So you see, even though Johnny did lose McCoy, he has another and Johnny is telling everybody right now that as

soon as he can chip off the rough edges, Alexander Theil-Al McCoy will be able to manage the daylight out of the Dan Morgan managed Al McCoy.

Young Ahearn, who wasn't much shucka heretofore as a middleweight warrior, is being heralded throughout England as "one of the most brilliant boxers of the present day," and as "the man who will hold the undisputed championship of the world." Ahearn has made a great hit in England by putting away all the fourth and fifth round scrappers who have been lined up against him.

Boxing is becoming more popular every day in Australia, declares Snowy Baker, the Australian promoter, in a recent communication to friends here. Baker says that the whole island is abuzz over the question of which man is the better in the middleweight division Jimmy Clabby, Eddie McCourt or Jeff Smith. Baker has written Billy Murray, the California middleweight to hurry to Australia and mix in the elimination bouts that are soon to be arranged to decide from Australia's viewpoint, which man is the best in the world.

Baker's idea is to match up the four men, the winners of the semi-final bouts to meet in the championship scrap. Baker declares that such a bout would bring a record gate.

BASEBALL BIRTHDAY BULLETIN

1875—Jesse Niles Tannehill, famous southpaw pitcher long with the Pirates and the Red Sox, born in Dayton, Ky. While with the Boston Americans he was the author of a no hit game against the Chicago White Sox on August 17, 1904. Two years later Tannehill prevented his team from meeting with 11 consecutive reverses by piloting it to a win over Chicago. Tannehill starred first in Richmond, Va., and joined Pittsburgh after Cincinnati had declined him. He pitched for the American league in 1907, casting his fortunes with New York, but he and Clark Griffith could not get along and the Old Fox traded him to Boston. In the Hub Tannehill did excellent work. From Boston Tannehill went to Washington two years ago, winning 11 and losing 10. He pitched for the Senators, his highest credit being .342, made with Pittsburgh in 1910.

1853—Joseph H. Conzelman, one of the pitchers of the Pittsburgh National League club, born in Bristol, Conn. This is the first season he has pitched steadily for the Pirates, who signed him on the strength of the record he made at Brown university, of which he is a graduate. Twirling for the Bruinians in 1911 against Columbia, Conzelman fanned 31 men. Conzelman made his debut with the Pirates on May 1, 1912, and after losing one game for them was sent to Atlanta for seasoning. His record in the Southern league last season was 11 victories and four defeats.
