

DOUGLAS SMELTER SHATTERS FORMER RECORD IN YIELD

Calumet & Arizona Plant Turns Out More Ore Than Ever Before.

Douglas, Ariz., Aug. 5.—During the month of July all previous records for production were shattered by the Calumet and Arizona smelter here when it turned out 1,250,000 tons of copper. Eighty-five thousand tons of ore were smelted.

In January and March this record was approached when a little more than 1,000,000 pounds of ore were smelted. Every part of the big smelter is now working well, and increasingly better results are anticipated.

Heaviest Ore Train Arrives. Last week was featured by the arrival at Douglas of the heaviest ore train ever received from the Calumet and Arizona mine at Bisbee. It consisted of the full capacity of approximately 10,000 tons of ore per car.

El Tigre Output Large. The output of the El Tigre mine of Sonora during the month of July was as heavy as usual. About 8000 tons of ore were treated at the crushing plant. This is the full capacity of the mill.

The vein was cut last week on the fourth level of the Kelly shaft. The grade of ore exposed is declared to be excellent. A force of 500 men is now employed at the El Tigre.

9000 Tons of Ore Exported. The report of the customs collector at Agua Prieta shows that 9000 tons of ore, mined in Sonora, were exported to the United States in the month of July. Of this amount 8225 tons came from Nacozari. El Tigre shipped 98 tons of gold and silver, amounting to 11,575 pounds.

The estimated value of the ores shipped in Mexican currency, is computed as follows: copper, 491,800 pesos; gold, 378,000 pesos.

Hooper Leases Smelter Dump. R. L. Hooper, who is now here on a visit, has secured a lease on the old dump of the United Verde smelter at Jerome in which there are said to be more than 1,500,000 tons of material to be treated. He expects to begin removing the slag about August 15. The slag will be treated in the new smelter at Clarkdale.

BULGER TOWNSITE SOLD FOR A DOLLAR

Denver, Colo., Aug. 5.—The town of Bulger, Colo., has been sold for the cash consideration of \$1. E. M. Arzoo, who purchased the town, will plant corn on the main street and will build a corral on the site of the hotel. The ornamental street lighting system of the town will be left intact. Bulger was founded three years ago by James Bulger, soldier of fortune of the Mexican revolution, and well known in El Paso.

The town was in Larimer county, adjoining the tracks of the Colorado & Southern railroad. The decline of Bulger as a municipality came when the railroad raised its right of way and left the town 15 feet below the tracks.

OIL DRILLERS IN PEGOS VALLEY ARE NOT DISCOURAGED

Despite Failure to Strike Petroleum or Gas, They Continue Operations.

Carlsbad, N. M., Aug. 5.—Despite the fact that no oil or gas has yet been struck in the wells being drilled in the Pecos valley by several companies which have drilled as deep as 2000 feet, there is no sign as yet of a suspension of operations.

Experts announce that no other field with such strong indications of oil and gas has failed of development. The drillers are unanimous in the belief that oil will be found, though it may be necessary to go to sea level to strike the pool, and indications are that the best wells now being drilled will go to a depth of from 4000 to 5000 feet.

Pumping Brown Well. The Brown well near Dayton is being pumped daily and is yielding from 50 to 75 barrels of oil. It is this well which is encouraging the companies now prospecting in the lower valley to continue operations, being proof that oil does exist in this region.

Drilling at Oil City has been delayed the past week as a result of the tools being lost in the well. However, a "fishing tool" was secured from an Oklahoma company and it is expected to remove the lost tools and permit a resumption of the drilling.

JUMPER FLATS MINES ATTRACT MUCH INTEREST

Ore Running From \$500 to \$700 Is Found in Several Places.

Bisbee, Ariz., Aug. 5.—Interest continues strong in Jumper Flats district. A number of claim holders are prospecting their properties and several have encouraging reports. The Traux mine continues to take high grade ore from the main lead at the discovery point. At other points on the lead where openings have been made good ore is found and prospecting on other claims is bringing satisfactory results.

Ore running \$600 to \$700 has been found at several points on the Traux property and interest in the property is increasing. It is believed that millions in gold are available.

Steps are being taken to bring the Greene Cananea mines to normal conditions. Protection for the company officials and those mine workers who wish to work is promised by the Mexican officials and it is believed there will be no further trouble in the camp.

Fires which were started in the Cananea mines were extinguished through the efforts of Bisbee men who were sent there for the purpose.

MAKES MOTORCYCLE TRIP FROM AUSTIN

H. Leslie Jones has arrived from Austin, where he had been attending the state university, and will spend the remainder of the summer visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Victor E. Raggio.

Mr. Jones made the trip from Austin on a motorcycle, covering about 325 miles in seven days. He had intended coming to El Paso by the border, and so routed his trip from Austin through San Antonio and Del Rio. Finding he would be unable to take the border route, he then made his homeward journey through Sonora, Oaxaca and Sheffield, where he crossed the Pecos river, to Port Stockton, thence proceeded to Alpine, Sierra Blanca and El Paso.

On his trip he had to cross about 19 bridgeless streams, some of which he negotiated on the cycle, while others had to be waded.

Mr. Jones is one of the three "yell" leaders of the university and will enter on his junior year next fall. He intends to return to Austin on his motorcycle.

WILL BUILD \$15,000 APARTMENT HOUSE

Capt. R. R. Hillbrand is arranging to build an apartment house on North Stanton street, just north of his home, on the corner of Stanton and Missouri streets. The apartment house will contain 12 apartments and will cost \$15,000. The building will be of brick and will be fireproof in construction.

EUROPEAN WAR MAY HELP BOOST PRICE OF COPPER

First Effect Has Been to Cut the Price and Handicap Mining.

Miami, Ariz., Aug. 5.—Because of the general progress in the price of copper has declined sharply during the past several days and as a result some Arizona miners are reducing their force, but a reaction is expected which will boost the price.

The Warrior mine has laid off about one-half of its force. Other mines have taken similar action and there are a large number of miners at present idle. But local mining men are of the opinion that the European war will eventually result in the price of copper taking an upward ascent. The dreadnaughts are built largely of copper and the European fighting forces will need copper in connection with their operations. The extension of military telegraph and telephone lines and railroads will necessitate large quantities of copper. All these things during war time must be paid for in cash. With the end of the work of rebuilding the cities, railways and navies will start. This will bring an increased demand for copper.

Pushing the Work. Rapid progress is being made during the past week on the storage reservoir near the concentrator. The concentrating is being done in sections extending about 100 feet per section. Each section being four feet in width around the slope. About 15 blocks, or 640 square feet are being laid per day. The whole structure is being reinforced with Clinton fabric. The riveting of the concentrator is now under way, but as there are 40,000 rivets to be driven, it will be about two weeks before the job is completed.

ELKS GIVE \$100 TO HELP BUDGET FUND

Elks have initiated the lodge subscription list to the chamber of commerce budget fund. At the meeting Tuesday night the Elks' lodge subscribed \$100 to the budget fund. It is expected that all of the local lodges and fraternal organizations will subscribe to the town building fund, now that the Elks have taken the initiative. More than \$1000 was obtained by the subscription committee Tuesday and the budget fund continues to grow slowly toward the \$50,000 mark.

The budget fund now totals \$22,843 and the property owners are beginning to subscribe liberally. J. W. Hubank, who is not one of the large property owners, subscribed \$100 to the fund. Norwood Hall, who gave \$25 last year increased his subscription to \$50 this year and later voluntarily increased this subscription to \$100. The Clay Robinson company, a new cattle brokerage firm, subscribed \$100 to the fund.

BODY OF HARRY HUBBARD TO BE BURIED AT MARFA

According to E. E. Winter, brother-in-law of Harry Hubbard, the Marfa mining engineer who died last Saturday in Matatlan harbor, aboard the American cruiser California, following an operation for appendicitis, the body will be sent to San Diego, Calif., and then shipped to Marfa, where the wife and two children of the deceased and his parents live, and where burial will take place. Mr. Hubbard was a 2d degree Mason and a member of the Mystic Shrine of El Paso.

CABLE MESSAGES IN CODE ARE FORBIDDEN

Code cables and wireless messages abroad are denied El Pasoans as a result of the European war. Supt. S. P. Jones of the Western Union, has been notified that no code messages for European delivery are to be accepted nor are messages to be accepted for transmission by cable that have code addresses or code names attached. The names of the sender and receiver must be written out plainly and must be in English or French. Code language is absolutely prohibited, while wireless service has been suspended in European countries. This is a part of the neutrality regulations of the United States government as it is not intended that anything shall be done to assist any of the warring countries if it can be prevented.
