

Tuesday afternoon's storm was particularly damaging to the valley below El Paso for a distance of eight or ten miles and it was the most severe in the memory of persons living in the section covered.

Corn in the valley was stripped by the wind and hail and the pear and fruit crop generally suffered from the wind and hail. The loss on the pear orchard of H. S. Bowman, Jr. is alone extremely heavy.
