Invaders, Repulsed, Are Pursued by Belgians Toward Vilvorde.

SERVIANS THREATEN REVENGE ON AUSTRIA

French, Announcing Reverses, Say Allied Armies Have Fallen Back.

PARIS, France, Aug. 25.—Belgian troops were victorious over the Germans in a four-hour battle today, according to dispatches received here from Antwerp. The dispatches say the Germans attacked Malines and, after a hard battle were driven off by the Belgians. The Germans were pursued in the direction of Vilvorde.

SERVIANS HURL INVADERS OUT

Nish, Servia, Aug. 25.—Serbian troops recaptured Sabac or Shabatz, as it is sometimes called, at 4 o'clock in the afternoon of Monday, Aug. 24, according to an official announcement made today.

Kaiser Confers Iron Cross on Princes Winning Battles

Berlin, Germany, Aug. 25, via Copenhagen and London.—Emperor William has conferred the decoration of the Iron Cross of the second and first class on crown prince Frederick William and duke Albrecht of Wurttemberg. He has conferred also the Iron Cross decoration of the second class on his son, prince Oskar.

EMPEROR'S UNCLE IS REPORTED SLAIN

Paris, France, Aug. 25.—The Journal this afternoon says it has obtained from an authentic source the news that in a battle fought Monday, an uncle of emperor William, commanding the imperial guard, was killed.

SHELLS DESTROY AUSTRIAN PORT

Rome, Italy, Aug. 25.—A dispatch to the Corrier D'Italia from Antivari, Montenegro, says the fortifications of Cattaro, the Austrian seaport in Dalmatia on the Adriatic, have been completely destroyed and that the Austrian commander is now parleying for terms of surrender.

GERMAN STEAMER ESCAPES THE ESSEX

Delaware Breakwater, Del., Aug. 25.—The North German Lloyd steamer Brandenburg, which sailed from Philadelphia Saturday from Bergen, Norway, with all available space filled with coal and nearly a year's supply of provisions, has eluded hostile warships and is now well out to sea.

BELIEVES HUNGER WILL END THE WAR IN EUROPE

New York, Aug. 25.—Hunger will bring peace in Europe, in the opinion of Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia university, who arrived Monday on the Principe Di Salaparuta after the war had interfered with his plans to visit the German emperor in response to a personal invitation.

CANNON DESTROY DEADLY ARSHIP

Antwerp, Belgium, Aug. 25.—A Zeppelin airship, which flew over Antwerp Monday night, was brought down by Belgian artillery fire six miles outside of Antwerp. The crew of 15 men was taken prisoner.

BRITISH WILL AID JAPAN IN ATTACK

Tokio, Japan, Aug. 25.—The battle of Eiao Chow, in which the Japanese fleet is bombarding the Germans at the fortified port of Tsing Tau, is supposed to be continuing. On the land side, British regiments have been ordered to cooperate with the Japanese troops.

FRENCH RESERVISTS ARE RETURNING HOME

French reservists from Arizona, New Mexico and Mexico are passing through El Paso en route to France to fight with their organizations. A number of these reservists have called on the local French consular agent and others have written for information to the consular agent.

KAISER'S ARMY IS CRUSHING ALL DEFENCES

Ten Thousand French Prisoners Are Taken by Germans, Berlin Claims.

ARMY OF GERMAN CROWN PRINCE WINS

Greater Part of the Belgian-French Frontier Is Now in German Hands.

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The War At a Glance

NAMUR, the Belgian fortress, has fallen into German hands, according to the official press bureau in London. British newspapers regard the fall as insignificant.

Berlin dispatches say rev. of the forts of Namur and the city itself have fallen and the capture of the remaining four forts is imminent.

A reverse to the forces of the allies is generally admitted by the English and French newspapers, which say today "news is decidedly bad."

It is assumed that the allies are falling back on their first line of defensive works running from Maubeuge, in a southeasterly direction by way of Hirson, Metziers, Montmédy, St. Mihiel, Toul and Epinal, all of which are strong fortresses.

Behind these another strong line of fortifications from St. Quentin in the north through Laon and Reims to the great entrenched camp at Chalons.

The English newspapers declare that the English and Russians are determined to "fight to a finish" whatever the outlook may be.

In other parts of Belgium fighting is still in progress and a report from Ostend says 15,000 Germans have been taken prisoner.

Charleroi has also been the scene of hot fighting, this time between the French and German troops, and a fresh encounter is believed to have begun there today.

Twenty-five thousand Germans have been surrounded between Courtrai and Asselhem, according to an Ostend dispatch to the London Daily Express.

Brussels has been left by the main body of German troops, who have proceeded on their way to the front.

GERMAN DIRIGIBLE WRECKED.—A German dirigible balloon which had flown over Antwerp yesterday was brought down by the Belgian artillery today and 45 of its occupants taken prisoner, according to a newspaper dispatch.

Another telegram says bombs dropped from a balloon wrecked several dwellings and one of the missiles struck a hospital, which, however, was occupied only by the medical and nursing staff.

TO MARCH ON PARIS.—The foreign wireless dispatch from the German embassy at Washington records a severe defeat of the French troops by the Germans in a battle which raged from August 17 to August 21 and in the course of which 150 field guns and 10,000 prisoners were captured. It says Lusville was captured by the Germans, and that the army of Gen. Joffre, the French commander in chief, has been broken up and is retreating toward Paris.

RUSSIAN ADVANCE.—Russian reports relate the advance of the Russian army in eastern Prussia. Russian officials, however, caution feeling too great caution over the preliminary successes, pointing out that the German territory about the Vistula is strongly fortified along the line of the Russian forward movement.

FLEETS DESTROY CATTARO.—Newspaper dispatches assert that the Austrian fortified port of Cattaro, Dalmatia, has been destroyed by the allied fleets.

SERVIANS WINNING.—Dispatches from the Serbian provisional capital, Nish, record the victorious offensive movement of the Serbians and Montenegrins against the Austrians, who are said to have suffered severely.

GERMANS TRY TO CRUSH ENEMY

WILHELM'S ARMY, WINNING AT NAMUR, ATTACKS ALONG THE BATTLE FRONT.

FRENCH IN ALSACE REPULSE ATTACKS

BRITISH, HEARING OF NAMUR'S FALL, RESOLVE TO FIGHT THE GERMANS TO FINISH.

LONDON, Eng., Aug. 25.—Seeking to recoup the losses of Monday when the French and English troops were driven back in Belgium before the German advance, the allies battled desperately with advancing German forces today, urged on to renewed efforts by the German capture of five forts of Namur on the Belgian at the end of a two days' bombardment. It was reported that the remaining four forts at Namur were on the point of falling.

In Lorraine, after the counter attacks of Monday, the right of the French forces withdrew to the river Mortagne which is a continuation of the Meuse from Lunéville to Nancy.

A French war office announcement today denied the reported capture of Muehhausen by the Germans. It stated that the theater of operations in Alsace is becoming of secondary importance.

GERMAN ATTACK ALLIES' WINGS.—The Central News circulates a dispatch from Paris saying that an official communication given out in that city declares that German cavalrymen belonging to an independent division are operating on the extreme right and on the extreme left position of the allies.

FIGHTS FIERCE AT OSTEND.—A dispatch from Ostend to the Evening News says there is fierce fighting between the Belgian gradarmies and the German cavalry in the outskirts of the city. Wounded are being brought in.

ALLIES DRIVE BACK ADVANCE.—The German offensive movement in the north, which was stopped Monday, appears today to have been resumed.

THE ENEMY, HOWEVER, IS BEING HELD BACK BY A FRENCH ARMY SQUADRON BELONGING TO AN INDEPENDENT DIVISION OPERATING ON THE EXTREME RIGHT AND ON THE EXTREME LEFT POSITION OF THE ALLIES.
