LOOKING FOR A VILLA REVOLT

Former Federals Said to Be Now Ready to Join Him Against Carranza.

Gen. Francisco Castro, one of the highest Mexican officers in the prison camp at Fort Wingate is said to have communicated to all of the prisoners a manifesto asking that a brigade be formed to join Villa. The manifesto provides for a meeting place as soon as the prisoners are released and specifically states that the purpose is to join Villa as against Carranza.

From Villa's camp reports of the formation of a federal junta. The head of this is said to be Celestino Campora, brother of the famous "Colorado" leader, "Che-Ché" Campora, Rodolfo Garza Alcázar, brother of the former minister of foreign relations in the Huerta cabinet, is also in Houston. He is reported to have raised a fund of \$25,000 for buying ammunition as soon as Villa declares against Carranza.

Other wealthy and prominent members of the Houston federal junta, according to the advice, are Francisco Mucera, part owner of the Monterey brewery, Manuel Garza and Jesus Gutierrez, all prominent "scientific" of Monterey. Gen. Emilio Campa, who was recently in El Paso, is now in San Antonio. He is a former Orozco leader.

All communications received here regarding a counter revolt continually refer to Villa declaring against Carranza.

GIL'S MEN IN REVOLT. The 4500 troops under Gen. Benjamin Gil in Sonora, ordered to proceed with their leader to Casas Grandes, refused to leave the state of Sonora, according to advice received here Saturday. This action is taken as a protest against the order, which virtually expelled all Carranza troops from Sonora.

The orders for the withdrawal of Gen. Gil and his troops was issued by Gen. Alvaro Obregon, following a conference at Chihuahua with Villa. It is stated that the action was taken so that governor Maytorena would be left in full charge of the state, the only apparent way to end the internal strife in Sonora.

Gen. Juan Cabral, accompanied by his staff, arrived in Juarez on a special train Saturday morning from Chihuahua. Cabral will proceed tonight to Nogales, Son., where he will take charge of the military of the state, succeeding Gen. Benjamin Gil, who has been ordered to Chihuahua.

An order had been received stating that Gen. Cabral has been appointed both military and civil governor of the state. When asked regarding this, Cabral absolutely denied that he was to take over the governorship, stating that his powers would be strictly military.

Gen. Cabral was accompanied to the border by Julio Madero.

CARRANZA WILL RETURN RAILROADS TO COMPANY

Washington, D. C., Sept. 18.—Fears of the American bondholders of the Mexican National railways were considerably allayed Friday when congressional agent Hillman advised the state department that the Constitutional government proposed to turn the operation of the roads over to the company after a shareholders' meeting in October.

Mr. Hillman reported that the Carranza officials explained the action as an "exigency of war." The Mexican government owns 51 percent of the stock of the railways and the Constitutionalists will elect new directors at the proposed meeting.

REPRESENTATIVE OF AGUILAR CALLS UPON GEN. FIJONTO. Veracruz, Mex., Sept. 18.—The first step toward turning over the port of Veracruz to the new Mexican government was taken Friday when Col. Rafael Marinero of the Constitutional army entered the city and called on Brig. Gen. Fijonto, whom he informed of the presence of Gen. Candido Aguilar and a brigade just beyond the American outpost line.

Gen. Fijonto suggested that a representative of Gen. Aguilar or the Constitutional commander himself should come in and discuss with him the terms of the surrender of the city. —Advertisement.

VILLA LOADING CAVALRY, CHIHUAHUA REPORT SAYS

Villa was reported to be loading cavalry horses at Chihuahua Saturday morning to take them to Madero, on the Mexican North Western railroad. It is thought he is sending cavalry to police the western part of the state and to send to Sonora if they are needed.

IMPLEMENTERS OF PEACE BOUGHT BY MANUEL MADERO.

Manuel Madero, brother of Francisco I. Madero, has bought a carload of machinery for his ranches in Coahuila from Dallas hardware companies and is having it shipped to El Paso and into Mexico. The order included a traction engine for operating threshing machines and other farm machinery on the Madero ranches in the republic.

BEARS MESSAGE TO WILSON.

Sau Antonio, Tex., Sept. 18.—Gustavo Espinosa Mirles, private secretary to Carranza, is en route to Washington with a message from the Constitutional chief to president Wilson. Mirles, who was in San Antonio Friday, refused to discuss his mission, except to assert that it had to do with the peace and prosperity of Mexico.
