DEEMING it advisable because of the delayed arrival of George Hayes, promoter Roy G. Since leaving El Paso, where he fought Johnny Dundee during the latter part of July, the veteran has had a number of fights over the short range, winning them all. He is in excellent trim for the battle with Albert. Before leaving his home Hayes did several days' training and will start immediately at the Stanton camp, in preparation for the Albert contest.

Confident that he is still in the running for the lightweight title, and as manager a considerable for the crown of the division as any of the present crop of light weights, Hayes is still looking forward to the best in order to make the lightweight title. The match with Albert, at 125 pounds was arranged for a convenience for both batters more than anything else.
