

"RING" WORKS FOR COLDWELL

Say He Will Be Named Judge by Colquitt; Grambling For Recorder.

Ballard Coldwell will be named special district judge to fill out the remainder of Judge M. Nagle's term, if the "ring" can put him over, and the leaders of the organization say it can be done.

They are so sure that Gov. Colquitt will appoint Coldwell, who is now city recorder, that they are preparing to select a recorder to succeed Coldwell. This will be Allen R. Grambling, one of the young lawyers who has been active in the organization of the Young Men's Democratic club.

Monday the Bar association met and elected J. G. McGee for the special district judge temporarily until Gov. Colquitt could appoint a successor to Judge Nagle. The Bar association also recommended E. Z. Thompson to the governor for the position.

After this was done, the organization leaders announced that Coldwell and not Thompson would be appointed by Gov. Colquitt to fill out the unexpired term. They say that the recommendation of the Bar association is nothing more than an endorsement of the candidate and that the governor will use his political horse sense in appointing a man acceptable to the organization in El Paso, since he is a candidate for the United States senate and El Paso has two "ring" members of the new legislature.

To prove that they believe what they are saying, Grambling has been elected for the position of recorder for the corporation court to succeed Coldwell when he becomes special district judge. Grambling is a graduate of the University of Texas and is associated with John L. Dyer in the law practice.

BIG SPRINGS MAN SELLS MELONS HERE

El Paso has been eating Big Springs watermelons in large quantities during the past week. Four carloads of watermelons raised by farmers of the Big Springs neighborhood have been sold in El Paso, the sales averaging a carload a day.

The melons were brought here by Fox Stripling, former secretary of the Big Springs Commercial club, and now a real estate man in the Howard county capital.

Mr. Stripling bought the melons from the farmers in the belief that he would find El Paso a good market for Howard county produce, and he found it a better market than he had imagined. Three of his cars of melons were sold to wholesale dealers and one car was retail.

Mr. Stripling had planned to ship in several more cars but received a telegram Tuesday afternoon announcing the illness of his wife at Big Springs, and he returned home to be with her.

CALIFORNIA LEADS WEST IN CORPORATION TAXATION

Washington, D. C., Sept. 25.—With collections of \$11,900,000, California led all the Pacific and mountain states in the taxation of corporations in 1912, according to a report of the U. S. Commissioner of Internal Revenue. That amount was exceeded only by Pennsylvania and New York, and was not approached by any other state. The report covered Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico, California, Washington and Oregon. Of that group California alone separates the source of state and local revenue. The special taxes fixed on corporations for state purposes yielded about 76 percent of the required revenue.

Commissioner Davies stated that in contrast to the use of special taxes on corporations in California was the "almost complete dependence on the general property tax in Nevada and New Mexico."

COMMERCE WITH EUROPE RETURNING TO NORMAL

Washington, D. C., Sept. 26.—Commerce between the United States and Europe is rapidly gaining normal proportions. Secretary McAdoo, of the treasury department, announced Tuesday night that in the last several days reports from shipping centers showed material increases in the export trade.

Monday, 26,722 bales of cotton were shipped to European ports. This is the largest amount shipped in a single day since the war began. Of the 26,722 bales, 1259 were exported from New York; 1250 from Savannah, and 17,122 from Galveston.

TWELVE MEXICANS ARRESTED IN SOUTH OREGON ST. CASE

Charged with being drunk and disorderly, 12 Mexicans were arrested Wednesday morning by the police in a case at 511 South Oregon street. Melillo Monbrilla was arrested at his home at 3015 Main street Tuesday night, charged with being disorderly. It is alleged he cut his daughter's arm with a knife.

EL PASO GOING TO CRUCES FAIR

Meeting This Evening Is to Plan For Annual Valley Pilgrimage.

El Paso will invade Las Cruces Saturday to celebrate El Paso day at the Donna Ans county fair and to invite all Las Cruces and the Mesilla valley to the military tournament next week.

Meeting This Evening.

A meeting of the chamber of commerce directors, the creators of the Rotary and A.D. clubs, the members of the Automobile club and other business men, will be held at the chamber of commerce at 8 o'clock this evening to arrange for the trip to Las Cruces Saturday. El Paso day is always the biggest day at the fair and is attended by crowds of El Pasoans who go up the valley in their automobiles and on the Santa Fe train.

May Take Military Band.

A special train was first planned for the trip to Las Cruces Saturday, but so many are going in automobiles that the Santa Fe will be asked to add extra coaches to their regular train, which leaves here for the north at 8:30 a. m. and returns at 6:10 p. m. An effort will be made to take one of the crack military bands from the border brigade to Las Cruces to lead the parade through the streets of the upper valley metropolis and to give a complimentary concert to advertise the military tournament Thursday, Friday and Saturday of next week.

Advertising for the tournament will be distributed in Las Cruces and through the valley and the residents of the valley will be invited to attend the tournament as the guests of the city and army.

The El Paso-Phoenix road race in November will also be considered at the meeting this evening.

COURT HOLDS FEE FOR CANDIDATES IS ILLEGAL

Renov, Nev., Sept. 26.—By holding constitutional a provision of the new election law requiring candidates for state offices to pay a fee of \$100 each, the supreme court today barred six Socialist candidates from a place on the general election ballot. The candidates having no opposition at the primaries asked to be certified as party nominees according to law, but refused to pay the fee, holding it to be unreasonably high. The court held the amount not unreasonable, although a dissenting opinion declared the sum is the largest required by any state.

The offices concerned are minor, the major offices of the same state being protected by the payment of the fee.
