

# MESILLA VALLEY TO BE FILMED

San Diego Fair Commissioner to Make Movies of Upper Valley.

Donna Ana county, the Mesilla valley, Las Cruces and the Elephant Butte dam will be seen daily by the thousands of visitors to the San Diego exposition.

Donna Ana county has appropriated \$2000 for advertising the county and its resources at the southern California exposition. Charles Bell, the photographer and motion picture operator for the New Mexico publicity commission for the San Diego fair, will be in the upper valley next week and will make 3500 feet of film showing the scenic resources of Donna Ana county and the big government dam.

**Publicity Commissioner Here.**  
A. E. Koehler, of the commissioner of publicity for New Mexico, was here Tuesday on his way to Carlsbad to arrange to make 3500 feet of pictures in Lincoln and Quay counties. He expects to make 25,000 feet of film in New Mexico for the fair, and it will be shown in the New Mexico building daily in connection with the illustrated lectures which will be given during the exposition starting Saturday.

**Claudeville Photos Film.**  
Commissioner Koehler says that the Claudeville and Sacramento mountain pictures that were made under his direction from the front end of a train on the mountain road are great and will be one of the big features of the New Mexico exhibit. There is 1800 feet of this film and it has already been developed and prepared to be shown. Indian dances of all the tribes in New Mexico have been made by the publicity commission, and pictures of the Indian pueblos will also be shown at the exposition.

# LEGISLATORS MAY QUIT WEDNESDAY

All Now Is Needed Is for House to Concur in Senate Resolution.

Austin, Texas, Oct. 26.—Final adjournment of the special session of the Texas legislature may come at noon Wednesday. All now needed is for the house to concur in the senate side die adjournment resolution.

An effort is being made in both branches of the legislature to pass the Terrell-Kirby voluntary reduction cotton acreage bill, despite the fact that the house last night killed the cotton acreage reduction measure on the same subject. The constitution prohibits the consideration of legislation on the same subject when a bill on that subject has been defeated by either branch.

**Apprais From Decision.**  
Representative Calvin offered an amendment to the bill providing for a 50 percent reduction in cotton acreage, based on last year's acreage. The chair held this amendment out of order and Calvin appeared from the decision of the chair.

Before a vote could be taken on the Calvin appeal, the house recessed. An effort was made to get up the senate side adjournment resolution, which was received in the house, but the motion to recess prevailed.

Should the house concur in this amendment, the present called session will terminate at noon tomorrow.

When the senate met today senator Nugent offered a concurrent resolution providing for sine die adjournment of the legislature Wednesday at noon. It was first laid on the table and then called up later and adopted by a vote of 12 to 11, but the senate refused to reconsider and table by a vote of 11 to 12. This means that the resolution may be called up again by a majority vote.


**Terrell's Effort Fails.**  
An attempt was made by senator Terrell to suspend pending business, which is the gin-mill divorce bill, and take up his voluntary cotton reduction bill. The point of order was then made by senator Collins, that this bill could not be considered, because a bill on the same subject had been killed in the house last night, due notice of which had been received by the senate.

When the senate met today senator Terrell's effort failed. The senate adjourned until 10 a. m. tomorrow. This action not only assures the defeat of the cotton bill but also of the attempt to pass the Terrell voluntary cotton acreage reduction bill.

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# LOOK OUT FOR BULLETS ON MESA

Infantry to Fire Real Bullets at Dummy Soldiers of the "Enemy."

Look out for bullets on the north mesa!

The 16th infantry will fire real ball cartridges at dummy soldiers of the "enemy" half hidden behind rocks and brush on the mesa, Wednesday, El Pasoas are warned by Col. Omar Bundy to keep off the mesa during the remainder of the week, especially that part of the mesa beyond the stone house.

The firing will begin at 8 o'clock Wednesday morning and will continue for the remainder of the week. The 16th infantry has been given a set of tactical problems by Gen. J. J. Pershing, commander of the eighth brigade, and these will be worked out on the mesa, with live sized targets in the shape of silhouettes of men kneeling or standing to represent the "enemy." Ball cartridges will be used to test the marksmanship of the soldiers.

**Real War Game.**  
The war game is a part of the proficiency test conducted by Gen. Pershing. The targets are concealed in large pits and operated by ropes in a similar way to the targets in a similar war game on the mesa to test the shooting ability of the regiment and this proficiency test will complete their work.

Spectators, providing they keep out of the way, will be welcome. The trails will be posted in larger signals and sentries stationed to warn people away.

**Today's Tests.**  
Col. George H. Morgan of the 15th cavalry, and Maj. Wilson T. Davidson, of the medical corps, began the first part of their three day riding test Tuesday morning. The officers will ride 50 miles a day for three days, riding a different route each day and riding their own mounts. This test ride is compulsory for every field officer above the rank of captain and a physical endurance test. The officers of the eighth brigade will take their test rides the 27th and 28th.

The sixth field artillery officers and noncommissioned officers will take their test ride "Bassett" the 26th and 27th. The course beyond the 26th infantry camp at Fort Bliss is being put into condition for this event.

**West Point Adjutant Coming.**  
Capt. George Vidmer, adjutant of the West Point Military academy, has been ordered to Fort Bliss to act as adjutant for that regiment at Fort Bliss in December.

Thomas J. Erickson, chaplain of the sixth field artillery, is expected to arrive at Fort Bliss next week from Fort Riley, Kans.

Bishop of the sixth field artillery, who has been military attaché in the American embassy at London, has been relieved from that duty and, at the expiration of a three month leave of absence, will join his regiment at Fort Bliss.

There will be no more military band concerts in Cleveland square until next summer. The increasing coolness of the evenings is responsible. These band concerts twice a week have given pleasure to many thousands of people during the summer, as the 16th infantry, conducted by Simon Trevisan, and the 6th infantry band, conducted by Max Miller, have played excellent programs of music.

The cavalry band will continue for a short time longer to play evening concerts at Fort Bliss and then will give its concerts in the afternoon during the winter.
