AMERICANS FORM HOSPITAL CORPS

Twenty Motor Cars For the Wounded Equipped by American Volunteers.

London, Eng., Nov. 8.—The American volunteer motor ambulance corps, organized by Richard Norton of Boston, Mass., has equipped to move ambulances to assist in the immediate removal of wounded from the battlefields in Europe.

Among the volunteers going with the ambulances are D. B. Starr and W. J. Oukum, graduates of Harvard; W. J. Berry, a graduate of Princeton; W. E. Clyde, Dr. Allan Loney, and Arthur Kemp, of New York.

RUSSIAN TROOPS CONSTANTLY WOULD MAKE THAT CITY THE CAPITAL OF RUSSIA, DRIVING THE TURKS OUT.

London, Eng., Nov. 8.—Now that Germany has been beaten back through Poland to east Prussia, no Russian doubts that Constantinople will be the capital of Russia. Constantinople is considered the natural, as well as the logical goal for Russia's conquest, according to the Petrograd correspondent of the West.

German Invasion Abandoned. Similar tactics have been employed on other points, with the object of preserving the best troops. This would appear to indicate that the Germans have given up their Russian invasion and will once more concentrate against France and Great Britain in Belgium.

SWEDEN PLANS TO ADD TWO SEMI-DREADNOUGHTS Stockholm, Sweden, Nov. 8.—The new defense act has provided for a big increase of strength of the Swedish navy. It is expected that two semi-dreadnoughts, specially designed for use in Swedish waters, will soon be constructed.

BELGIAN SOLDIER PERFORMS HEROIC FEATS ON BATTLEFIELD London, Eng., Nov. 8.—A Belgian soldier, 24 years old, is a member of the Order of Leopold and of the Legion of Honor, as a result of his heroic exploits, according to a dispatch from the Cherbourg correspondent of Reuters' Telegram company.

CHILEAN TRANSPORT SEARCHES IN VAIN FOR BRITISH WARSHIP Valparaiso, Chile, Nov. 8.—The Chilean transport Mallo has returned to Port Gallao after a fruitless search in territorial waters and for 20 miles out at sea between Cape Carranza and the Mocha islands for the British cruiser Monmouth, that has been missing since last Sunday's naval battle.

BRITISH OFFICER FORMERLY ON MEXICAN BORDER KILLED Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 8.—Word has been received here of the death with the British forces in France of Maj. G. Paley, a popular officer who for several years was attached to the Canadian headquarters as a director of military training, and was attached to the United States army along the Rio Grande in 1912.

LABORER'S END OF WARS

Executive Council Report Offers Suggestions for Making World Peace.

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 8.—A plea for the abolishment of war and suggestions of plans for making world peace were given in the annual report of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor, which was presented today.

Concerning the European war the report says: "The war is said to be the product of artificial conditions and policies and repugnant to the thought and political progress of the age. As far as we have made little progress in providing agencies for organizing international relations to maintain peace and justice."

How to End War. Summing up steps that may be taken toward the abolishment of war, the report continues: "Military and competitive armaments must be abolished and tribunals for awarding justice and agencies for enforcing determinations must be instituted. International interests and agencies must be established corresponding to political developments. Those most interested should lead in demands for world federation and the rule of reason between nations."

Uzes Moderation in Mexico. Turning to the Mexican situation the report makes special mention of president Compaera to Rafael Zubaran Capmany, saying the Federation more than any other American agency except the government of the United States, aided the success of the "prospective government" and urges the withdrawal of the army of occupation of those who speak or assume to speak in the name of General Carranza.

Unemployed in Vienna Aided by the Women's Franchise Committee. Vienna, Austria, Nov. 8.—For the social benefit of the middle class who are employed in Vienna, the Austrian women's franchise committee has organized "citizens' war dinners." A substantial meal, consisting of soup, meat, and vegetables, is served in the dining rooms of the hotels, and is supplied for eight cents.

Insult English Tobacco. The director of the Austrian tobacco monopoly is credited with saying that the public have been showing loyalty by rejecting all tobacco products manufactured in England or France. Both there and in Budapest the tobacco associations met and pledged themselves not to import any English cloth.

Through the efforts of the Red Cross society some 20,000 index cards of names from Austria-Hungary war prisoners in Russia and Serbia, have already been delivered to their wives and friends at home. The correspondence from both countries comes through Romania. The letters, of course, are read by the official censors in the country where they are written. The Austrian papers admit that the correspondence of the whole gives the impression that the prisoners are being well treated. In Russia the wounded receive medical attention, and a grand duke visited them in hospital at Moscow.

They cloth-lined weather step keeps out the cold. Rathbun-Mix Co.—Adv. Heart Test Apparatus Causes Scientist's Death. Montreal, Canada, Nov. 8.—Professor G. H. Mines, of McGill university, met death mysteriously and tragically in his laboratory at the university Saturday night. He was making experiments dealing with the phenomena of heart action and respiration, and it is believed he probably lost his life through some derangement of the apparatus which was attached to his body.

Professor Mines had been in the laboratory all afternoon working on his experiments. He was discovered in an unconscious state by the janitor shortly after 6 o'clock. The broken mechanism was still attached over the professor's heart. A doctor was summoned and professor Mines was conveyed to the Royal Victoria hospital, but he died before midnight without having recovered consciousness.

GERMANS ADMIT BEARING POLAND

Russians Are Rumored to Have Crossed the East Prussian Frontier.

Berlin, Germany, Nov. 8.—The first reference showing the direction and extent of the German retreat from the Western front was contained today in a report mentioning the defeat of the Russian cavalry near Kolo, 15 miles from the German frontier. This shows that the Germans have retired behind the Warthe river, which, roughly, parallels the German eastern frontier, and, according to Maj. Morait, military correspondent of the Berliner Tageblatt, that the German forces have probably been withdrawn north of the Warthe on the west Prussian frontier.

There have been rumors for the past few days regarding the penetration of the Russians into German territory, some even mentioning Bromberg, which lies 43 miles northeast of Posen and timid inhabitants of the border regions from Breslau north to Posen have been abandoning their country houses, regardless of the presence between them and the Russians of Gen. Von Hindenburg's strong army.

Struggle Progresses Around Ypres. A decisive struggle on the Ypres front continues, Maj. Morait, is progressing around Ypres, which is now enveloped from the east, south and southwest and he declares that the allied retreatment is practicable only in northerly or westerly directions and that an attempt to break through the strong forces in the region of Lille would be fruitless. The allies will have held Ypres to no avail if the German advance on the front between La Bassée and Arras continues.

APPEAL FOR AID FOR BELGIANS Americans Asked to Provide Food and Money to Relieve Famine. New York, Nov. 8.—The Belgian relief committee here, which is cooperating with the Rockefeller foundation in aiding the starving Belgians, has appealed to people throughout the United States to come to the relief of the suffering in Belgium, with food or money, or both. Large quantities of food must be sent from America to meet the absolute necessities of the starving non-combatants.

RUSSIAN FLANKING MOVE IS DRIVING GERMANS OUT Petrograd, Russia, Nov. 8.—Owing to the general Russian outflanking movement on both right and left of the main front line from Siemiaty to Czenstochowa (Russian Poland), the last German position in Russian territory, is regarded here as fast becoming untenable. On the morning of the 7th the Russians have taken Kolo and the Germans have retreated ten miles to the west of Siemiaty. The possession of Siemiaty is now in progress.

FRENCH OFFICER EXPECTS NO PEACE BEFORE 1917 London, Eng., Nov. 8.—The Daily Mail today gives prominence to an estimate of a distinguished French officer, whose name cannot be divulged, but who is in a position to make such an estimate, that the Germans will not be driven back over the Rhine before February, 1917, and that peace will not be concluded before 1917.

EMPEROR WILLIAM ALARMED BY REVERSES, CALLS COUNCIL London, Eng., Nov. 8.—A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram company from Rome, Italy, says: "German advice received here says that emperor William, much affected by the reverses and administrative of a council of war which was attended by Gen. Von Hindenburg, the duke of Wurtemberg, and the Austrian chief of staff, field marshal baron Conrad Von Hotzendorf, to decide on a further plan of campaign."

ALGERIA LOYAL TO FRANCE. Washington, D. C., Nov. 8.—Assurances of the unshaken loyalty of Algeria to France, as given by the governor-general of the colony, was repeated in dispatches Sunday from the French foreign office to the embassy here.

RUSSIAN BLACK SEA FLEET LEAVES ITS BASE, REPORT. Amsterdam, Holland, Nov. 8.—The Frankfurter Zeitung learns from Constantinople that the Russian Black sea fleet left Sebastopol, proceeding in an easterly direction. Two Turkish submarines cruised in the Aegean sea, later returning to Constantinople without having sighted any hostile warships.
