

# THREE BIDS FOR COUNTY'S BONDS

Commissioners to Hear Bids Tuesday—Take Authority From Judge.

Three bids for the court house and jail bonds will be submitted to the county commissioners at their regular meeting Tuesday afternoon. W. A. Myrick, of Beaumont, and Allen Frake, of Chicago, representing C. W. McNair, a broker, arrived Monday morning and held a conference with county judge Adrian Pool and will appear before the commissioners Tuesday to submit bids. The Curtis-Manning Co. of this city, will also submit a bid.

At a recent meeting, the new board of county commissioners adopted a resolution which prevents the county judge or any other county official from contracting for, or making purchases of any goods or services without the commissioners first give their sanction.

The resolution reads: "Be it resolved by the county commissioners of El Paso county, Texas, that each and every resolution authorizing or empowering of any nature or nature whatsoever, directly or indirectly, authorizing or empowering any person, officer, firm or corporation to make any contract of any nature whatsoever, in the name of or for, or binding, on the county of El Paso, or to employ any person for said county, or to procure, or obtain any goods, wares, or merchandise or valuables for said county, be, and is hereby rescinded and annulled."

# \$300,000 BRICK PLANT'S BEGUN

International Brick Co. Starts Work on Its Clay Products Factory.

Another \$300,000 manufacturing project started construction work Monday morning at the Cotton addition. The International Brick Co. financed by the International Bricklayers' Union, started preliminary work on the site and tracks for the big brick and clay products plant at the end of San Antonio street.

S. J. Hatfield, designer and general manager of the new brick plant, has returned from Columbus, Ohio, and is directing the start of the preliminary work Monday morning. A number of kilns, drying buildings and machine shops will be built on the tract which was purchased several months ago. The plant will have a capacity of 350,000 tons of clay products each day and employ 250 men when it is in operation.

The shale and clay will be obtained from the New Mexico side of the river, opposite the current plant.

# SIX ROBBERIES ARE REPORTED SUNDAY

Six robberies and holdups occurred Sunday evening and the police have made a number of arrests in connection with the crimes.

# DEATH CLAIMS CAPT. O'CONNOR

Retired Army Officer Well Known in El Paso, Passes Away.

Capt. Steven O'Connor, United States infantry, retired, died Nov. 15, at the Littlemore sanitarium in California. The funeral service was held by the Blue Lodge of San Francisco, from the Masonic temple and the body was interred with military honors in the National City cemetery at the Presidio. Capt. O'Connor was 78 years old. He had been in the regular army for over 40 years, his last assignment being the 23d infantry. He was retired from active service in 1899.

Capt. O'Connor had made his home in El Paso for many years and is very well known throughout the southwest. He went to California last May. Capt. O'Connor was survived by his widow and daughter, Miss Mary E. O'Connor, who reside in El Paso; a son, Dr. Roderick O'Connor, of Oakland, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Eliza Rochester, and Mrs. Maggie Peters, of San Diego, Calif.; two brothers, Charles O'Connor, of National City, Calif., and William O'Connor, of Alaska.

Dr. Roderick O'Connor was formerly in the army medical corps and reached the grade of major. He resigned about a year ago to enter into private practice in Oakland.

Capt. O'Connor was the owner of some valuable mining claims in Santa Cruz county, Arizona, and about three years ago killed a man in some trouble over a claim, but was acquitted as having acted in self defence, when he was tried at Tombstone.


