WILEY SUIT RICH IN LOCAL LORE

Aged Negro Uses Early El Paso History to Win His Suit From the City.

Judge Howard's "salt war" Gen. Anson Mills' map of old El Paso, the location of the old postoffice, custom house and other buildings were revealed in the suit of the city against W. W. Wiley, the aged negro, in an effort to open South Oregon street through to the river.
