

## MORGAN QUILTS SCHOOL BOARD

G. R. Fisher Also Quits; Alves Dixon and J. C. Worthington Named.

Accepting the resignation of J. E. Morgan as president and member of the board and of George R. Fisher as member and secretary of the board, and electing Alves Dixon and J. C. Worthington to fill out the unexpired terms, the board of school trustees held a short session Monday night at the Bailey school and then adjourned to Wednesday night to give the newly elected members an opportunity to participate in the deliberations.

Chairman Adams called the meeting to order. He is expected to be named as president. The resignation of George R. Fisher as secretary and member was tendered and accepted. The resignation of J. E. Morgan as member and president of the board was also accepted and the chairman appointed a committee consisting of Frank Simmons, Robert L. Holliday and Dr. J. A. Pickett to draw up suitable resolutions thanking Mr. Morgan for his work with the board.

**New High School Discussed.**  
A communication from Jennings & Woods asking that bidders on the El Paso High school submit alternate bids for the structural portion of the building based on the company's designs using a combination burnt clay tile and concrete in the floors and trussed bars in the footings, beams and floors. It was agreed to furnish a complete set of engineering plans. The communication was referred to Trott & Frost, architects for the building for investigation and report.

A committee from the Alta Vista Improvement club, consisting of David McKnight, N. S. Corbin and E. E. Patton, appeared before the board, asking that steps be taken to the roof of the Alta Vista school building in order that a roof garden may be fitted up. The committee also asked that the complete top of the building and was assured that, should the proposed bond issue carry, the enlargement of the structure would be taken up.

The monthly statement of H. A. Schaffer, auditor, was submitted showing total expenditures for the month of \$21,324.47; total revenue, \$4,505.41; deficit for the period, \$16,819.06. For the eight month period the statement showed expenditures, \$122,517.85; total revenue, \$101,417.62; deficit, \$21,100.23.

## Only Six Out of Ten Eggs Reach Table; Rest Broken

New York, Dec. 22.—Only six out of every ten eggs laid ever reach the consumer. The rest are broken through careless handling in transit from the nest to the retailer, etc. In a few cases, eggs are allowed to spoil. This is the statement of William Mann, attorney for the New York Central Railroad company, who testified Monday at the inquiry into the butter and egg business by the attorney general's office. Mr. Mann placed the value of the annual egg crop at \$500,000,000 and the estimated waste in eggs at \$200,000,000 a year.
