

SCOTT PREDICTS MORE PARLEYS

American Chief of Staff Believes He Can Bring About Peace at Naco.

Naco, Ariz., Dec. 25.—Gen. Scott expects to settle the difficulties attending the combat of Mexican factions across the line, but is of the opinion that further conferences with Gen. Hill and Maytorena will be necessary. Gen. Scott and governor Maytorena met for the first time late Thursday in an army tent pitched on the international border west of here. They were within easy range of Gen. Hill's cannon, but the latter, on request from Gen. Scott, did not fire toward Maytorena and his escort.

GUTIERREZ HAS MIXED CABINET

Washington, D. C., Dec. 25.—Provisional president Gutierrez of Mexico has completed the selection of his cabinet, with the exception of the portfolios of justice and interior, by appointing men from both the Villa and Zapata followings. His representatives here today received a message giving the composition of the new cabinet as follows:

Foreign relations—Jose Ortiz Rodriguez.
War—Gen. Jose Isabel Robles.
Finance—F. F. Villareal.
Public works—Valentin Gama.
Education—Jose Vasconcelos.
Communications—Jose Rodriguez Cabo.
Agriculture—Gen. Manuel Palafox.
Gama and Palafox are Zapata followers. The latter formerly was Zapata's secretary. The other members are followers of Villa. Vasconcelos is Carranza's special representative of Carranza here and visited England on a special mission.
The Gutierrez government, today's message said, is going away with the military tribunals and is administering justice through civil tribunals.

Salazar After Palomas.
A small group of Salazar troops under Col. Manuel Gutierrez, a former commander of federal irregular troops, has raised and captured the property of the Palomas Land and Cattle Company, just south of the Palomas-Columbus port which has been a sub-port for the exportation of cattle. It is supposed that Salazar intends to take Palomas, which is garrisoned by a few Villa troops, and thus allow himself the privilege of importing munitions of war which has been prohibited by Carranza and Villa forces at the ports of entry they control. The ranch raided is one of the largest in Mexico. It is owned by Los Angeles, and the cowboys were driven away, and all the horses and cattle confiscated.
Salazar "Army" Small.
Gen. Salazar, with a small personal following, is visiting various isolated points in northwestern Chihuahua and, though often met by small bands of Villa soldiers, he is not molested, according to an El Pasoan who returned Thursday from a trip through the northern part of Chihuahua. According to the El Pasoan, Salazar has a large following, but has not yet secured sufficient arms and ammunition to move them and for this reason he has not assembled all of his forces. Not once has he been attacked by Villa troops, the El Pasoan says, although he has repeatedly met small bands sent out from towns along the North Western railway.
Persons arriving here from Naco confirm the report that Rogues Gomez, the "Colorado" leader and now an agent of Salazar, representing Villa at the border town for the purpose of holding a conference with Hill, the Carranza commander, Gomez has with him two other "Colorados." All three are registered at the hotel under assumed names.

Carranza spent Christmas in Orizaba and Villa in Mexico City, according to messages received Christmas day by representatives of the two leaders in El Paso. Both leaders are scheduled to return to their followers on the border. No conferences were held at Naco Christmas day and Felix Somerfeld and Roberto Pasquero, representing Villa and Carranza, respectively, spent the day in El Paso. Both stated that the conference was proceeding satisfactorily, but that they were preliminary work had been done. For more than a week there has been no change in the position of the opposing forces, and very little firing.

VASQUEZ GOMEZ WILL GO TO TRIAL IN SHORT TIME
San Antonio, Tex., Dec. 25.—The neutrality cases pending in the United States district court here for conspiracy brought against prominent Vasquez during the administration of the late president Madero are scheduled to come up for trial early in January.
Emilio Vasquez Gomez, who is prominently mentioned in the Zapata candidate for the provisional presidency and who is the author of both the "Plan of Tacubaya" and the "Plan of Ayala," both revolutionizing programs, is already here, and David de la Huerta, late minister of Huerta is also here, having been arrested a few days ago by deputy marshal Daniel Manuel Garcia Aldape, also one of the Huerta ministers whose bond was forfeited, for nonappearance at the last term of court is now on his way here to give a new bond.

DULUTH ROUNDHOUSE BURNS; EIGHT ENGINES DISABLED
Duluth, Minn., Dec. 25.—Eight locomotives were disabled, four of them totally destroyed, when the Duluth roundhouse of the Duluth, Winnipeg and Pacific railroad partially was destroyed by fire today. The loss is estimated at \$150,000.

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Funeral Dirges Played For Doomed Saloons of Phoenix; Hughes Hops

Phoenix, Ariz., Dec. 25.—Bearing aloft a banner with a picture of a fight between a barrel and an axe that had resulted in disastrous results to the barrel, Dr. H. A. Hughes led the Italian school band to every saloon and wholesale house in Phoenix yesterday afternoon. Before each saloon a mournful march time was played. Automobileists in sympathy with the wetts tried to drown out the band with horns. There was much excitement and a huge crowd but no disorder.
Nearly ten years ago, after the first prohibition election Phoenix ever had, the victorious wetts hired a band and surrounded the residence of Hughes, who had conducted the dry campaign. Yesterday when word came that the injunctions restraining the enforcement of the prohibition amendment had been denied, and Arizona must dry up Jan. 1, Hughes got his revenge.
