

ANTS WOULD BANKRUPT EL PASO AND REPUDIATE DEBT, SAYS RING

Charge That Anti Theory of Municipal Government as Proposed Would Run the City into Bankruptcy and Increase Tax Rate 79 Cents on the Hundred Dollars, Based on the Present Valuations.

The policy upon which the anti-ring ticket would run the city is disclosed by question No. 7 asked by Mayor Kelly and published on page 1A of the El Paso Herald, Saturday, January 26, 1915. The question reads: "Is it not a fact that when advocates of the present administration assert that Mayor Kelly found a floating indebtedness of \$294,000 and that he has put the city upon a cash basis, that they really mean that he found a non-interest bearing debt of \$294,000 which he proceeded to convert into an interest-bearing debt by the issuance of bonds?"


