

\$20,000 APARTMENT PLANNED; GRANT AVENUE WILL BE PAVED

Largest Apartment House On South Side to Be Built By Goldoft Bros.; Cotton Addition to Be Improved With Paving, Parking and Sidewalks; Bungalow Homes Are Built and Sold.

Work was begun this week on a \$20,000 apartment house that is to be erected at the corner of Fifth and St. Vrain streets by Goldoft Bros. The building will be one of the largest of its kind in the southern section of the city and will contain 52 apartments of two rooms each. It will be two stories in height and will occupy a plot 120x150 feet with a large court in the center. The building will be of brick construction and will be ready for occupancy on April 1. H. T. Fossford has the contract for the masonry. Cotton addition is to be improved with asphaltic paving, sidewalks and parking. A. P. Coles & Bros., agents for the Cotton estate, have announced that the contract for paving Grant avenue from Cotton avenue to Alamo Heights has been let to the Texas Bitulithic company and work will start at once on the grading and paving. The avenue through the Cotton addition will be seven blocks long and will be 65 feet wide. The paving will be 25 feet wide

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
