Kelly Asks Lea and His Candidates Some Pointed Questions

Editor Herald: Recently the Anti-Kelly, or Anti-Ring organization, whichever you are disposed to call it, submitted a number of questions that I answered frankly and unequivocally. Much of what was contained in these questions was the veriest muddling, but I waived the right I might have asserted to refuse to answer questions that were not asked in good faith, many of which assumed as true matters that the authors (if they were endowed with ordinary intelligence) must have known to be false. My questions, as you will note, are signed by me. Their phrasology is respectful, there can be no excuse for not answering them, except a desire to keep the public in the dark. The public is entitled to know where these candidates stand on public questions. Glittering generalities and sob-sister, Dorothy Dix-Beatrice Fairfax speeches, such as have been made, will not take the place of a straight forward platform. Criticism is fault finding unless you answer with a statement of what you will do to improve the particular thing you criticize.

1. Mr. Lea, two years ago you worked and voted against the regularly nominated Democratic ticket, which had been nominated in an all-day primary held in compliance with law. Will you support me if I am nominated on February 16th? If so, why will you support a Democratic ticket now when you fought it two years ago, at which time you were chairman of the County Democratic Executive Committee? Do you think that if you were nominated this year Democrats would be honor-bound to vote for you when you, while chairman of the County Democratic Executive Committee, fought the Democratic ticket two years ago? Were you trying to catch Republican votes then? Do you not know your own Republicans of El Paso are too sensible to be caught by such bait—that they are sensible men and that your scheme was transparent? Don't you know they admire the man who stands by his colors? Please answer over your signature.

2. Mr. Lea, you profess to be a very warm-hearted man and fond of children, as shown by many of your speeches and by a story entitled "A Police Court Judge and Little Mexican Youth: A True Story of Tom Lea, Friend of the Friendless, Man Among Men," which appeared in the El Paso Herald Week-End edition August 8-9, 1914, page 4-A, and which appeared as an advertisement and so marked. Do you then approve the action of the "Anti-Ring" County Commissioners, who I believe are members of the club that puts you forward as a candidate, in attempting to withdraw the salary of the El Paso County Probation Officer, the lady whose duty it is to look after helpless, dependent and delinquent children? The public has a right to know how you stand. 3. The El Paso Herald, Saturday, February 6th, 1915, on page 3, in its account of a meeting held in your interest at the skating rink, quotes your law partner, Mr. Thomson, as saying: "There was Mr. Morgan, for instance, he stayed right on as a member of the board until a couple of weeks before the contract for the new high school was let, and he got the contract—the other contractors of the city who put in bids never had a chance." The members of the School Board who awarded that contract were J. C. Worthington, F. B. Simmons, Dr. J. A. Pickett, R. L. Holliday, H. R. McClintock and Claiborne Adams.
