President Orndorff Inaugurates Weekly Chamber of Commerce Feast.

NO HIGH SCHOOL FOR TULAROSA

Vote Is Against Proposition; Movement to Move County Seat From Alamo.

Alamogordo, N. M., Feb. 8.—Figures taken from the poll books by Charles E. Thomas, county clerk, show a majority of 11 votes against the proposition to establish an additional county high school at Tularosa. These figures are official, and J. W. Brownfield, arriving yesterday from Orange, reports a majority of eight against the new school at Orange. With only the small precinct of Oakes unreported and the majority now standing 19 votes against, it looks certain that Tularosa has been defeated.

The Otero County News, published at Alamogordo, is authority for the statement that a petition is now being circulated in some of the districts, asking the commissioners to relocate the county seat from Alamogordo to Cloudcroft.

Garbage Disposal. Mayor Kelly is wrong. He is not criticized for not using the garbage disposal plant. He is criticized for wasting from \$25,000 to \$30,000 each year of the taxpayers' money in maintenance and interest charges to keep up his bluff of burning garbage which he knows, or should know, is being dumped on the vacant lots owned by the city south of and adjoining Washington park, where it rots and breeds flies, deadly disease germs and noxious smells, to the danger and discomfort of every resident of East El Paso.

Hurting the City. Mayor Kelly, by year almost criminal neglect, in the matter of spending a few dollars which to provide for the drainage of Chihuahuita, through which thousands of tourists are forced to pass every year on their way to and from Juarez, have you not done more to injure the city of El Paso than any other known agency? Is calling attention to that man and placing the responsibility for that eye-sore where it properly belongs hurting El Paso? So far from hurting the town does it not better the standing of the city because it calls attention of strangers to the fact that civic pride and public conscience are not dead but only held in check through the machinations of an unconscionable political boss? Do you not know that it does not hurt El Paso because it makes those who read the statements aware of the fact that there is a tendency on the part of the people to free themselves from pernicious bossism and to clean up the disease-breeding plague spots of the city? If you, Mayor Kelly, had raised a finger or spent a dollar during the four years and more you have been in office to drain Chihuahuita and portions of East El Paso, as you should have done, do you not know there would be no smallpox, scarlet fever or zeptheria to talk about and that the pest house, which is now a menace to the safety of East El Paso, would not now be an issue?

A Few Waterworks Figures. Is it not true that the annual audit of the city's books, to which you frequently refer, as the great safeguard of the taxpayers' interests, shows, in the analysis of the profit and loss account of the water works department, total receipts, \$207,697.65; operating expenses, \$138,066.15, and a net revenue, from operation, of \$69,631.50? Does not the analysis further show deductions from income of \$81,735.01, leaving net income for the year ending March 31, 1914, \$7,896.49? Is not one of the items of the "deductions from income" "interest on bonds" amounting to \$22,850 and is not the inference to be gathered from the audit that the waterworks are not only self-supporting, in that they pay operating expenses, but that they pay interest on investment? In your budget, Mr. Mayor, for the year 1915, do you not call for \$59,058 to be raised by direct taxation with which to meet interest on waterworks bonds? Is it not a fact then that so far from showing an annual net income of \$7945.90 the waterworks department shows a net loss of \$51,131.02? Do you call this, Mr. Mayor, an evidence of efficiency or economy?

WILSON TO FORCE SENATE TO YIELD

Threats Attend Debate Upon the Ship Purchase Measure in the Senate.

Democrats. The debate on the appeal this was continued. 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JUAREZ TO HAVE PAVING AND NEW SEWER SYSTEM

V. E. Ware and Victor Curuso have been awarded the contract for the paving of the principal streets of Juarez, together with the laying of a sewer system under all streets paved. The total cost of the work which will be begun at once, will be \$200,000.

The streets to be paved are those traversed by the street railway, Avenida Juarez, Comercio street and Avenida Lerdo, together with a part of the street traversed by the race track line. The contracts were awarded Monday afternoon by mayor Juan Medina and Hipolito Villa, fiscal agent of the Villa government at Juarez.

HOT WORDS IN ILLINOIS HOUSE NEARLY CAUSE FIGHT. Springfield, Ill., Feb. 8.—Sharp words were passed on the floor of the lower house of the legislature today and for a time threatened to be the cause of a fist fight between representative Lee O'Neill Brown, of Ottawa, and Michael S. Igoe, of Chicago, both Democrats.

Igoe criticized Brown for having entered a caucus of 40 Democrats. Igoe said Brown had been quoted at the beginning of the session as saying he would not enter a caucus unless it was attended by all the Democrats.

"Do you mean me?" yelled Brown. "You are a liar," shouted Brown. "So are you," retorted Igoe. Brown doubled his fists and started toward Igoe. Friends rushed into the breach. Brown apologized to the house for having used such language. He then referred to Igoe as a "kid" and a "child."

REVIVAL INTEREST INCREASES AT FIRST METHODIST CHURCH. Revival services at the First Methodist church continue to well attended and 50 were added to the church Sunday.

Rev. W. H. Huff, the evangelist, spoke from the subject, "Wilt thou be made whole?" and delivered a strong sermon.

"The same Jesus who made the important man of the first century whole can, and will, make every sinner of the 20th century whole who asks him," he declared in his address.

RECEIVER FOR WHOLESALE DRUG FIRM IS APPOINTED. St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 8.—A receiver was appointed today for the Meyer Brothers' Drug company, a large wholesale firm, on petition of three creditors whose claims aggregate \$40,000. They allege that the debts of the firm to other creditors exceed \$500,000. The firm was established 65 years ago.

It is stated the firm has been unable to collect accounts aggregating \$400,000.

HOME OF REV. HENRY EASTER IS ROBBED SUNDAY NIGHT. While Rev. and Mrs. Henry Easter were at church Sunday night, their home on Rio Grande street was entered by thieves and ransacked.

About \$10 in cash was taken and a number of articles of silver. It is believed that the thieves entered with a pass key.

The front door was found unlocked and the back door and windows were opened.

PULLMAN CONDUCTOR DIES. James J. Wallace, a Pullman conductor, died Monday night at a local hospital. He was about 33 years old. He came to El Paso about seven years ago from Roxbury, Mass., and has been connected with the Pullman company since coming here. He has no relatives in El Paso. He is survived by a widow and several children living in Roxbury, where the remains were sent Tuesday for burial.

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
