

HOLLAND IS MOVING TROOPS; INUNDATION WORKS PREPARED

The Hague, Holland, Feb. 22.—In preparation for possible eventualities, Dutch engineers are preparing the inundation works so that in the event of war the system could be opened and Holland partially submerged. In addition, troops are constantly being moved to the frontier. This has given rise to much public uneasiness.

Copenhagen, Denmark, Feb. 22.—The Scandinavian countries are not planning to act in concert with the United States and Holland with reference to the protests against Germany's sea blockade. 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

RUSSIANS AND GERMANS TRADE WHO WILL GET THE JUDGESHIP?

Commercial Travelers From Germany Book Russian Orders, Despite War.

Copenhagen, Denmark, Feb. 22.—While the commercial blockade between England and Germany is maintained rigorously, there appears to be no particularly strong feeling against trading between Germany and Russia. Business men from the two countries continue to deal with each other, and commercial travelers from Germany are said to have booked orders for Russia, after meeting their customers by appointment in Denmark or Sweden.

SWISS FROM OBSERVATORY WATCH TROOP MOVEMENTS

Paris, France, Feb. 22.—Swiss military authorities have erected an observatory on a height near Bernol from which the movements of French and German troops can be watched, according to a dispatch to the Swiss news agency. A Swiss military balloon is also in the same neighborhood with the purpose, it is supposed, of detecting possible transgressions on Swiss territory.

AUSTRIANS SAY 2000 RUSSIANS ARE CAPTURED

Vienna, Austria, Feb. 22.—Big battles are developing between Russian and Austro-Hungarian forces south of the Danube river, according to an official bulletin issued here. It states that a severe fight was fought on Sunday after a long fight, and that 2000 Russian and four guns and much war material were captured.

PRUSSIAN DIET VOTES FUNDS TO RELIEVE WAR SUFFERERS

Berlin, Feb. 22.—A Berlin dispatch receives by Reuters' Telegram company states the Prussian diet has voted 100,000,000 marks as a relief fund for war sufferers. Clemens Delbrück, the imperial minister of the interior, declared that a supply of food for the population at moderate prices is now assured.

AMERICAN FACTORIES ARE INSURED AGAINST WAR

London, Eng., Feb. 22.—During the past few days American factories and other industrial enterprises have taken out a large amount of insurance against war between the United States and other countries, the insurance being placed with London agencies, according to the Times.

RUSSIANS CONCENTRATE TO ATTACK CONSTANTINOPLE

Copenhagen, Denmark, Feb. 22.—An official dispatch from Sofia, Bulgaria, states the Russians are concentrating large forces at Odessa, the Black sea port, apparently with the intention of making an attack upon Constantinople, the capital of Turkey.

LUXEMBURG CABINET RESIGNS

Luxembourg, via Amsterdam and London, Feb. 22.—The cabinet of the duchy of Luxembourg has resigned but no reason has been given for the ministers' retirement.

BRITISH GENERAL DIES

London, Eng., Feb. 22.—Brig. Gen. John Gough, who took prominent part in the retreat from Mons, and who since then has been several times mentioned in official dispatches, died of wounds received last Saturday.

U. S. FLAG MUST BE LEFT ALONE, SAYS FORMER DIPLOMAT

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 22.—Above all else there is one thing we must demand. The belligerent nations must let the American flag alone. It must not be hoisted falsely on any foreign ship. It must not be trifled with by anyone. This was one of the points made by Charlemagne Tower, former ambassador to Germany, in an address to the alumni of the university of Pennsylvania here Monday.

GUGGENHEIMS GIVE \$500 TO 'AMIGO LISTO' FUND

The Guggenheim interests have added a check for \$500 to the Amigo Listo fund. The check was received the last of the week by Mrs. Alberto Madero, who is in charge of the relief work.
