

"NEW EDUCATION LAW TO FORCE MORE SCHOOL ROOM FOR EL PASO"

Superintendent R. J. Tighe Says School Facilities Now Are Inadequate and Compulsory School Attendance Law Will Necessitate Much More Room; Gary System May Be Installed in Three More Schools.

THE compulsory education law recently passed by the state legislature, which will, if signed by the governor, go into effect next September, will mean a readjustment of the schools in El Paso in order to accommodate the children said R. J. Tighe, superintendent of the public schools in the city.

One land owner in the upper valley has announced that he will give his 75-acre ranch, rent free for the first year, and will sell the land at a reasonable price in subsequent years. He also offers to furnish a part of the seed and implements needed for the land if the Belgian farmers are brought here from the east. He believes that this is the way to develop the valley and is willing to make his ranch a test of the plan, he says.

Chicago, Ill., March 18.—The average annual income of engineers in the west are \$112.17 a month, according to statistics introduced at the western railroad arbitration conference based on reports from 527 engineers. This is only \$5 less than the estimate made by the railroad managers. The witness testified on the witness stand for the engineers.
