ARIZONA BUYS BUCKS IN AFRICA

Secures Angora Stock to Build Up His Pedigreed Flock Near Tucson.

Tucson, Ariz., April 27.—In order to build up his flock of Angora goats, Dr. John H. Wallis, of this city, has sent to South Africa for a number of Angora bucks of purest pedigree. One of these, nearly 12 months old, is said to have produced at one shearing 17 pounds of salable hair which sold for \$70.

Dr. Wallis, who now has 1100 goats in his flock, says he intends to increase it to 10,000. He said his object is to get first class stock and breed only blooded animals. The kind which he is securing from south Africa is one which does not shed its hair and the hair does not tear but easily in the brush.

Flock Increases 100 Percent. Dr. Wallis's flock this year has increased about 100 percent, he states, and he has shipped a little more than a ton of mohair. A firm in Kansas City, he states, is making a specialty of butchering goats and sheep for meat.

Some of the female goats, said Dr. Wallis, are giving milk in large quantities, and this has been churned into a satisfactory grade of butter.

ARIZONA RANGES HAD JUST SOLD

J.H. Yates Again Owns Clabber Hill Property; Adds Many Fine Cattle.

Midland, Texas, April 27.—J. H. Yates, who recently sold his Clabber Hill ranch and 3000 black milky cattle to C. A. Goldsmith, has repurchased the entire property and again is in possession of both ranch and cattle. With the repurchase of the Clabber Hill ranch, Mr. Yates has decided to enlarge his holdings. He has purchased in the Panhandle country 2000 yearling Angus heifers bought from Shelton & Trigg, owners of the celebrated "XIT" herd. From Elkins Brook & Bryant, Mr. Yates has bought 1400 yearling Angus heifers and he has also purchased 100 registered bulls for breeding purposes, the bulls being bought from G. F. Cowden & son.



ARIZONA AWDS BRING TOP PRICE

Heavy Shipments Are Being Made Daily From Salt River Valley

Phoenix, Ariz., April 27.—Arizona lambs and ewes are beginning to move out of the Salt river valley to the Kansas City market, where top prices are ruling. Arizona spring lambs are bringing from \$18 to \$17.75 apiece, while ewes are selling above \$4.

Already 25 carloads of sheep, mostly lambs, have moved from Salt river valley points to Kansas City. Within the next few days 25 more cars will be shipped. Shipments to Kansas City were late in beginning, owing to quarantine regulations, which have now been modified.

About 100 carloads of sheep have been shipped to Los Angeles and other California points this season. Within the next two weeks 60 more cars will be sent west. The season's total shipments, east and west, will reach 209 cars.

Heavy Shipments Daily. From five to 10 carloads of cattle are moving out of the valley each day. This is not an unusually heavy movement for this time of the year. The big shipments will begin in June. The cattlemen expect to send their light stock to California and their heavy steers to Kansas City.

At the present time cattlemen are receiving \$6.75 per 100 for fat steers. Some sales have been made as high as \$7.

James Cashion has just shipped two carloads of heavy draft mares, three and four years old, to Kansas City. This is the first time that any valley grower has invaded that market.

MAGDALENA CATTLE MEETING TO BE ATTENDED BY GOVERNOR

Socorro, N. M., April 27.—All southern New Mexico cattlemen are expected to attend the Magdalena cattle meeting which is to be held there on May 13 and 14.

The decision to hold a convention at Magdalena was made recently at a meeting of the Socorro and Magdalena boards of trade and invitations have been sent to cattlemen of the district. A number of well known El Paso cattlemen are also expected to attend.

WEST TEXAS PROSPEROUS TURNEY TELLS AUSTINITES

Austin, Texas, April 27.—Cattle and livestock generally were never in better condition in the western portions of Texas, according to former state senator W. W. Turney of El Paso, who was here on business Tuesday afternoon. He said that there was already evidence of much grass on the range which is rather unusual for this time of the year. Besides the cattle industry, the senator said that the west is developing at an exceedingly rapid rate and El Paso is the center of the boom for all of that western section of Texas.

ALAMOGORDO CATTLE FED ON ALFALFA SHIPPED TO MARKET

Alamogordo, N. M., April 27.—Cattle fattened on the alfalfa of the Alamogordo improvement company's lands have been shipped to Kansas City and are expected to bring a top price on the Kansas City market.

The cattle were bought as an experiment in feeding. The hay market was weak and W. R. Edison, manager of the improvement company, decided to feed the hay to a herd of cattle.
