MINERS IN MEXICO ARE AGAIN HAMPERED BY VILLA

The mining fraternity has been alarmed by another employers' decree issued by the Villa government, which it is feared will result in the confiscation of much foreign owned property.

According to the document, all property will be confiscated unless employees are paid in Mexican silver or American gold at the rate of two pesos for one dollar.

It is said that a protest has been made to Gen. Villa, without result, and protests have been telegraphed to eastern agents of the many American and other foreign owned mines in the Durango district.

A several mining law amendment which prescribed confiscation for its violation was issued recently by the Villa government, but it was postponed indefinitely upon urgent representations from the American state department.

ADVISE JUNE PEOPLE TO USE INJUNCTION

Kansas City, Mo., May 5.—The injunction is the most satisfactory method the miners' unionists have found for fighting what they consider unfair legislation, according to addresses Tuesday at the first annual convention of the National Miner's association.

William Hamaker, secretary and treasurer of the Auto Service association of San Antonio, Texas, told the convention that the business in El Paso, Ariz., Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth had won injunction suits against the enforcement of city ordinances they believed to be unfair.
