

GEN. GUTIERREZ, VILLAS, OBREGON, WHICHEVER WINS THE COMING BATTLE; VILLA IS PLAYING A WAITING GAME AT AGUASCALIENTES.

The Two Are Waiting For a Chance to Strike at Villa or Obregon, Whichever Wins the Coming Battle; Villa Is Playing a Waiting Game at Aguascalientes.

GEN. EULALIO GUTIERREZ, deposed president of Mexico, has appeared at La Victoria, on the southern border of Coahuila, with a force of 4000 men, according to private advice received in El Paso.

It is rumored that he is waiting there for Gen. Eugenio Benavides, who fled from Mexico City with him. Benavides is reported coming north from central San Luis Potosi with a column nearly as large as that of Gutierrez.

These two revolutionary leaders are supposed to be operating independently of each other. The Carranza or Villa factions are preparing to strike a blow for their own ideals when one of the two larger factions is eliminated from the civil struggle in Mexico.

Obregon Moving North. Carranza's troops have occupied the village of Loma, two leagues north of Leon, and are moving on to Aguascalientes, where Gen. Villa's army is entrenched, according to private advice received in El Paso from Veracruz.

Important skirmishes between Villa and Obregon cavalry patrols are occurring daily north of Leon, it is reported, but no engagement of any importance has taken place since the battle of Celaya. Gen. Villa has virtually finished the reorganization of his army and is waiting for Obregon's attack.

Carranza's Troops in Villa. George C. Carothers, special representative of the state department, left Mexico Tuesday to join Gen. Villa, according to dispatches received from the capital.

Gen. Carranza Makes Bid For Recognition of His Faction by the U. S.

Veracruz, Mex., May 5.—In conversation with a correspondent regarding recognition by the United States, Gen. Carranza Tuesday said that when peace is restored Mexico will be thrown open to all honest foreign investors, and that Americans will be particularly welcome.

Gen. Carranza said he wished to overcome the feeling in the United States that the Constitutionalists are opposed to foreigners. He also announced that he intended to restore railroad traffic to Mexico City as soon as the military operations against Gen. Villa are ended. He is in his headquarters in the light house overlooking Veracruz bay, the first chief of the Constitutionalists since the length of the future condition of Mexico.

Will Need Foreign Help. "Recent events such as the defeat of Gen. Villa at Tepic, point, renew my confidence that the Carranza faction will start legitimate foreign help. The resumption of operations will attract American capital, which will be welcome in the Carranza faction. I will do everything in my power to promote American friendship in the present controversy, except that I will not allow any American to see the situation from this end. The Constitutionalists have 10,000 soldiers and Villistas less than half this number."

We constantly are spreading our lines northward, leaving Mexico City to be easily retaken. We have no intention of leaving before you expect to see us there. We are sending our troops to Mexico City, and give foreigners there relief and a chance to resume business," Gen. Carranza was asked.

Just as soon as Villa is driven farther—possibly to the Gulf of Mexico—defeat will be a very short time.

Buying More Transports. "As an instance of our progress I call attention to the fact that we have sent a commission to New York to buy more armed transports, one to assist on the Pacific coast and one for the Gulf of Mexico. This will be done in the next few days."

Another mission will arrive in New York simultaneously to act on the foreign oil interests.

Indeed we are taking steps already for future industrial and financial relations. Our hope is that the United States will recognize us as the Constitutionalists.

There is every reason why the United States should recognize us, for the Constitutionalists are the only one which has legal responsibility. Villa and Zapala are the only ones who have no legal responsibility. The remnants of the old reactionaries, struggling to regain lost power."

FIGHTING NEAR TAMICO. Washington, D. C., May 5.—Officially the British cabinet today over reports that Villa and Carranza forces had resumed fighting at Tamico in the vicinity of the town of Tamico, Vera Cruz, and it is believed should ignite the British-owned oil wells or tanks, the supply for British warships would be increased.

CARRANZA AGENTS HOLD TUCSON MEETING AT TUCSON. Tucson, Ariz., May 5.—Carranza agents of this district held a meeting here to discuss details of their work. The meeting was held at the home of E. Padua, of Douglas, and M. T. Vela of Tucson. The real return of their conference was not disclosed.

GEN. VILLA NOT WOUNDED. Washington, D. C., May 5.—The Villa agency announced the receipt of a dispatch from foreign military emissaries at Chihuahua city saying reports that Gen. Villa had been wounded were untrue. It is believed that his officers were without foundation.

Has Its Own Appropriation Bill; Leaves Out Only Land Commission. Phoenix, Ariz., May 5.—Without waiting for a House to pass a general appropriation bill, the senate decided to take up and consider a bill proposed by its own committee. It is radically different from the measure over which the house has been struggling for the last three days.

The senate bill is complete, except that no provision of any nature is made for the land commission or land department. It carries \$2,500,000. Salaries that are not fixed by statute are slashed all along the line in the senate bill. For instance, the secretary of state is cut from \$2,000 to \$1,500 a year and the citizen member of the board of control from \$2,000 to \$1,500. These cuts are not made in the house bill.

Another May Reject Claims. A section of the senate bill gives the auditor authority to reject any claim that it is for a proper and legal expense. Each claim must be verified and sworn to by the auditor. The committee of the senate explained that this provision would make the auditor a censor in fact as well as name.

An interesting feature of both measures is that no deficiency can be made out of the general fund. It has been the practice heretofore, for any department or office to exceed its appropriation, to cover the excess from the general fund.

Objections Are Made. There was objection to the senate-appropriations committee introducing a bill. Senator Webb said that he thought it would be better to proceed to introduce the general appropriation bill in the senate. Stapley and other explained that the idea was not to pass the bill but merely to work out so that the senators would know what they wanted to do when the house bill came over. A motion to suspend the rules and refer the bill to the committee was lost by a vote of eight to six, two-thirds being necessary. Typewritten copies were available for all the senators and objection was raised that the measure would entail an unnecessary expense. Remarks by Clark were also made. The appropriation committee merely desired to get a little advertising, called forth a hot denial from Stapley.
