

TEXAS ELKS TO BACK WALLACE FOR HEAD OF ORDER OF ELKS

El Paso Quien Sabe Club Expects to Go to Los Angeles at Least Fifty Strong, Joined by All Other Lodges of the State—His Election Brings Headquarters of the Order to El Paso for a Year.

At least 50 strong, if present plans carry, El Paso Elks are going to the annual Grand Lodge convention and reunion in Los Angeles on July 12 to advance the candidacy of George E. Wallace for grand exalted ruler of the order in 1918.

Roy D. Barnum, exalted ruler of El Paso lodge, and vice president of the Texas association of Elks—also vice

country and, joined by every active member of the lodge, will make a vigorous campaign in the interest of Mr. Wallace from this time forward, for at the 1912 meeting at Los Angeles, it will virtually be decided who is to be the grand exalted ruler at the meeting a year hence.

Many Elks to Come Here. Mr. Barnum is also sending out circular letters to every lodge of Elks in the United States inviting them to visit El Paso en route to the convention and expects as a result to entertain a large number of people here in the early days of July.

The El Paso Elks expect to have the full strength of the Texas lodges of Elks behind them in their fight for Mr. Wallace. While W. H. Atwell, of Dallas, has announced his candidacy for exalted ruler in 1918, many of the lodges have long ago voluntarily pledged their support to Mr. Wallace, and his work as an officer of the grand lodge is expected to have its effect upon the majority of them, so that when the Texas delegation reaches Los Angeles and caucus, the Elks are looking for but one decision and that will be a solid state behind Mr. Wallace for the big job in 1918.

Has Worked for Elks. Mr. Wallace was district deputy grand exalted ruler of Elks in 1911-12 for what then formed the western district of Texas and for the first time in the history of the order, every lodge in the district was officially visited. The following year, because of the extent of the territory, Mr. Wallace had the district cut into three, and three men now preside over the same territory that Mr. Wallace covered during his incumbency. The result is officer visits and more enthusiasm among the lodges, and the members give the credit to Mr. Wallace.

Head of Judiciary Committee. In 1912, Mr. Wallace was appointed upon the judiciary committee of the grand lodge by exalted ruler Mills. Since that time he has been upon that committee. "The supreme court of the Elks"—the last two years as chairman of the committee, or chief justice.

Mr. Wallace has been a constant attendant upon the grand lodge and an active worker in its ranks since 1910, when he was elected delegate from El Paso lodge to the grand lodge meeting in 1910 at Detroit. In 1905 he went with El Paso lodge to Philadelphia as head of the Quien Sabe club. So far, there is no recognized candidate in the field for the position of grand exalted ruler and it is generally accepted among the big men of the order that Mr. Wallace is the man for the place in 1918.

Forced into the Race. Mr. Wallace has not announced his candidacy and does not intend to do so, but, on the suggestion of the various men high in the councils of the

order, his home lodge has placed him in the field and he is loyal enough to El Paso to make the race, though at some sacrifice, as the position of head of such an order requires a great amount of time and money.

The El Paso Elks will wear the uniform of the Texas Army of Elks at the Los Angeles convention. This is made of Texas cotton—white trousers, white blouse and white cap, with purple collar, braid and shoulder straps on the blouse. On the collar of the blouse will be "El Paso 1872." The cap is of the racing type.

Big Boost for El Paso. The election of Mr. Wallace as grand exalted ruler of the Elks will bring the headquarters to El Paso for a year and will mean a big lot of advertising for the city. It will mean the maintenance of a large office force here and will result in many of the biggest men of the country visiting El Paso from time to time. The councils of the order will all be held here and in many ways El Paso will get into the limelight. It will pave the way for El Paso to entertain the grand lodge gathering at some future time when it feels capable of taking care of such a crowd.

Urges All Elks to Help. Exalted ruler Barnum believes that the occasion warrants more than the usual interest in the Quien Sabe club and wants every Elk in El Paso who can, to join in the effort to elect Mr. Wallace. "Everybody wants to attend the fair in California this year," he said, "and I hope that all Elks who can will arrange their affairs so they can make the trip at the time of the big reunion, and accompany the Quien Sabe club as members. After the grand lodge meeting they can then go where they please. El Paso has always rallied when it was a question of doing something big for the state and there is a chance to honor one of our citizens and bring advertising to El Paso that will be lasting. I hope every Elk will help."

NORTH SIDE CENSUS SHOWS FEWER NUMBER OF CHILDREN

For a time he was house doctor at the Hotel Galvez in Galveston.
