

20,000 CATTLE CROSS AT NAGO

Heavy Shipments of Mexican Stock Are to Be Made Up to July 1

Tempe, Ariz., June 8.—Twenty thousand head of Mexican cattle will be brought into the United States at the port of Nago by July 1, according to an estimate furnished by livestock inspector Porter McDonald.

Plans are already being made here for the convention of the Cochise County Cattlemen's association, which is to meet here in September.

Horse races, broncho busting, foot races, a banquet, special show attractions and auto rides to historic places of interest are some of the features that are being arranged.

TAVAPAI TO SHIP OUT \$1,000,000 IN CATTLE

Prescott, Ariz., May 8.—It is estimated that the shipments of cattle from Tavapai county between March 1 and July 1 will amount to a total of \$1,000,000 to the growers. A shipment of 2,000 head has just been made from Mayer to Wyoming, and several hundred head are moving out of Kirkland each week, chiefly to Denver.

Soldierman cattlemen have contracted to deliver 6,000 head in June. About 2,000 head will be shipped from Williams valley this month, and already shipments from Walnut Grove total more than 1500.

Amarillo, Texas, June 8.—Portable shearing machinery, running as many as 12 machines to an engine, are being used by sheepmen of the Panhandle country. Shearing is now under way in Deaf Smith and Castro counties. Fleeces already gathered show weights somewhat less than those of last season, but are cleaner and of a better market value. The lamb crop is particularly good and sales are better than for several years.

DEMING PLANS 1916 MEETING

Cattlemen to Have Big Time at Convention; Yearlings Sell Fast

Deming, N. M., June 8.—Plans are already being made for the 1916 meeting of the New Mexico Stockmen's association which was voted to Deming at the Magdalena meeting. J. H. Nations, president of the Panhandle and Southwestern Stockmen's association, has promised the committee he will be present and will join the association when it meets here.

The meeting to be held at Magdalena on June 22 to perfect the organization, will be attended by a large number of the Deming business men who will work hard to have every member of the new association come to Deming for the next regular meeting.

Grant county cattlemen are having no trouble to find a market for their cattle, especially the yearlings, which are bringing good prices this year. Shipments are now being made from here, Lordsburg and Silver City and the buyers are in the field making purchases wherever yearling cattle can be found.

El Paso Buyers in Field. F. R. Coon, of Lordsburg; Sam Brown, of El Paso, and J. T. Ragsdale of Midland, Tex., have been here for the past week looking into the southern part of the county. A large number have been bought and will be shipped to Midland. At Rodeo F. R. Sanders, H. C. Washburn and J. C. Henderson have sold their cattle to these men. At Hachita, E. Winkler, T. J. Bennett and Harry Young have contracted for the cattle around Hachita, while other districts are preparing to sell the total yearling crop at fancy prices. The stock shipment will total 100 head and the Hachita shipment 800 head. These will be made July 1.

Portales and Tary, the Highland Cattle company, Mammoth Land and Cattle company, H. J. McGrath and other breeders in the Lordsburg district will ship a total of 1000 head of yearlings while a shipment of 1000 head will be made from Separ.

A shipment of 1700 head of yearlings is also to be made from the local valleys this week and other shipments will follow.

PALOMAS CATTLE COMPANY SHIPS 2300 HEAD TO DENVER

Columbus, N. M., June 8.—A total of 2,300 head of cattle have been shipped through this port from the Palomas Land and Cattle company during the past two weeks. Arthur McCormick is now in Mexico rounding up another herd of cattle which will be crossed this week.

A shipment of 1000 head of yearlings is also to be made from the local valleys this week and other shipments will follow.

SELLS 144 STEERS AT ABOVE 7 CENTS A POUND

Tempe, Ariz., June 8.—At 7 1/4 cents a pound a Kansas City firm has contracted with John Anderson, of Tempe, for 144 head of prime beef steers, which are to be shipped June 15. The prevailing price this spring has been around 6 1/4 cents. Anderson expects to ship at the same time about 300 more steers, which will sell in Kansas City at the market price.

TWO TRAINLOADS SHIPPED FROM THE PECOS COUNTRY

Pecos, Texas, June 8.—Two special train loads of cattle were shipped out of the Pecos country during the past week. One train of 20 cars was shipped by Val Keen to Portales. The other, 20 cars, were loaded at Van Horn and were consigned to the American Livestock & Loan company, at Borina, Texas. They were from the J. Z. Means & Co. ranches near Valentin.

PLAINVIEW HOGS BRING TOP PRICE IN MARKET

Plainview, Texas, June 8.—Plainview hogs have again topped the Fort Worth market, establishing a record price for the year. Morrison and Watson were the shippers. The average price received for two shipments was \$2.45, the highest live price since October. This price was equal to the Chicago top. The two shipments consisted of 67 head averaging 222 pounds and 63 head averaging 244 pounds.

TUCSON TO MAKE BIG SHIPMENTS

More Than 24,000 Cattle to Be Shipped to Feeding Ranges During Month

Tucson, Ariz., June 8.—During the next 30 days there will be more than 24,000 head of cattle shipped from this section to the feeding ranges. Their value is \$700,000.

Removal of the quarantine on cattle so far as other states are concerned and modifications of the quarantine on Mexican cattle is the cause of the large shipments, which have been held back this season by the quarantine order.

Big Shipments Already Made. Among shipments already made since the modification of the quarantine were 1683 head to Texas and New Mexico points by William Martinec and Otero, and 1000 head from the range of the La Osa Livestock and Loan company to Montana.

One thousand head will be shipped shortly by the Arivaca Land and Cattle company from its ranges to the Dakota for distribution among the Sioux Indians.

As yet no big shipments have been made to this point from Sonora since the Mexican quarantine was lifted. The stray American cattle that were gathered up in northern Sonora to be sent to this side are still being held by order of governor Maytorena.

Big Shipments From Valleys. More than 6000 carloads of cattle will be shipped from Tucson during this season, according to estimates of local cattle men. The shipment from the Tama Valley will be later than from other portions of Arizona.

PORTALES VALLEY GETS BLOODED STOCK

Portales, N. M., June 8.—A carload of Hereford bulls and a car of registered Hereford cows will be shipped to the Portales valley by F. Williams from Kansas City. They will be brought here and a number of them sold to local ranchmen to breed up the stock of this valley.

Horney & Jordan have received 42 head of pure blood, Hereford heifers and will be added to the big herd of thoroughbreds which this firm owns near here.

Oral Keen has also shipped in a mixed bunch from Pecos, Tex., and placed them on the Keen ranch. The stock includes cows, calves and steers. They will be added to the Keen herd which now numbers more than 1000.

A total of 7000 pounds of wool from 500 sheep is considered by Bob Dunlap as an excellent crop. He has finished his shearing and is preparing the crop for market.

Mr. Dunlap also has a number of "Buffalo Jongs" which are also yielding a good crop.

MEXICAN CATTLE SHIPMENTS HEAVY

Lifted Embargo Brings Rush of Mexican Stocks; Herds Rounded Up

More than 100 carloads of cattle from Mexico were passed through this city last week, the first week of the lifting of the quarantine on cattle. The greater amount of these cattle were entered at Columbus, N. M., and came from the Palomas Land & Cattle company ranches. Importations at the local customs house were relatively small, though cattlemen state that a number of large herds are being rounded up on the Mexico Northwestern railroad for shipment to El Paso.

During the week about 150 cars of cattle from the west were handled through this city by the T. & P. Of the Mexican stock not more than a dozen carloads were sent to market. The Mexican stock is in fair condition, but the greater part of it is being sent to range at Ocala, Hale Center, Pecos and Spur. A number of shipments from around Lordsburg have been handled through this city. This stock is in good condition and a considerable part of it is being sent direct to market.

Range conditions in west Texas are excellent and cattlemen believe that this summer will be one of the best in many seasons. The range in southern New Mexico and Arizona is also good. No large shipments of Arizona or New Mexico stock are scheduled for this week, but there will be another large bunch of Mexican stock through the latter part of the week.
