GERMANS SPEAK FOR PEACE

Favor Compromise With the United States So as to Prevent a Rupture.

Berlin, Germany, June 15.—An indication that Germany's political leaders are working for a settlement in favor of a peaceful solution of the difficulties existing between Germany and the United States, is contained in the fact that the Lokal Anzeiger prints an article on German-American relations by its general director, Eugen Zimmermann. Other leading periodicals are adopting the same course. A few of the more radical papers still persist in advocating an uncompromising attitude.

THE WAR AT A GLANCE

The Italian invasion of the Trentino, which heretofore has met with little opposition, is now challenged by the Austrians. A force of 25,000 Austrians left Trent Monday and is advancing against the Italians on the Riva-Rovereto front. The heavy fighting has occurred on the Leonzo front, north of the Gulf of Trieste. A dispatch from Innsbruck, Austria, says the Austrians and Gradisca have mounted to 1500, with nearly as large a total for the Italians.

BRITISH NAVY LOSSES, 13,547

London, Eng., June 15.—Thirteen thousand five hundred and forty-seven officers and men of the British navy, other maritime and members of the naval division, were killed, wounded or reported missing since the beginning of the war up to May 15, according to a statement made in London today. Of this total 8245 were killed.

ENGLAND WILL SPEND \$15,000,000 A DAY IN NEXT THREE MONTHS
