SUPREME COURT CHANGES COURSE

Will Review Caminetti and Diggs Cases; "Grandfather Clause" Annulled.

Washington, D. C., June 21.—The supreme court today reconsidered its denial of a review of the conviction of E. Drew Caminetti, of San Francisco, Cal., on charges of violating the white slave law, and granted a review. It also granted a review of the conviction of Maury L. Diggs, convicted with Caminetti, in the same case.

The court adjourns today for the summer. It will not meet again until October.

Harvesters Case Docketed.

The International Harvester company anti trust case was today restored to the docket for rearrangement. This postponement will be for at least a year.

Will Review Important Case.

The court today decided to review the decision of the supreme court holding that the five percent discount on imports in American bottoms provided in the Underwood-Simmons act extends also to goods imported from a favored nation treaty country.

Grandfather Clause Annulled.

The Oklahoma constitution "grandfather" clause, restricting the negro vote, was annulled as unconstitutional by the supreme court.

Chief Justice White Announced Decision.

Chief Justice White announced the decision, holding that it was a violation of the fifth amendment to select an arbitrary date, such as 1868, in fixing the qualifications of voters. The decision is believed to reach the "grandfather" clause, which is effective in many southern states.

Government Wins Lackawanna Case.

The railroad contended that the provision was not effective, because the lands were unfit for settlement, and furthermore, that the government was stopped from raising the question of forfeiture because of long acquiescence in the company's disregard of the selling process.

6,000 People Intervene.

About 6,000 persons who went upon the lands and claimed to be actual settlers, within the meaning of the law, brought a cross complaint asking that the railroad company be held to be a trustee for actual settlers and required to sell them. Some 5,000 persons who have not come upon the land to make settlements, but who have applied to the railroad company to purchase 100 acres intervened with a petition that the company be required, as a trustee, to convey lands to them.

Oregon Also Intervenes.

The state of Oregon intervened with the claim that the state levied nearly \$500,000 taxes a year on the lands and asked that the lands not be forfeited to the government, which case the taxes might be lost, but that the railroad be required to sell them for the benefit of the state.

The Union Trust Company of New York, trustee under a mortgage given on the land to secure \$25,000,000 of bonds used in building the railroad, also intervened.

The district court declared the lands forfeited, and the case was taken to the supreme court. It was argued late in April 1915.

TO CONSIDER FATE OF FIVE MEN ON JUNE 25

Phoenix, Ariz., June 21.—Friday, June 25, has been fixed as the date for the next meeting of the board of pardons. At that meeting the cases of Ramon Villalobos, Eduardo Perez, Miguel Peralta, Francisco Rodriguez and N. S. Chavez, the five murderers who were to have been hanged May 23, will be considered for the last time.

At the Friday meeting the board will promulgate a statement setting forth the facts in the cases of Villalobos, Chavez, Perez, Rodriguez and Peralta. It is probable that the statement will not be given publicly until some time next week.

The War At a Glance

AUSTRO-GERMAN forces are closing in on Lemberg, capital of Galicia. The German war office today announced the capture of Rawa Ruska 22 miles northwest of the city. Emperor William, who has gone to the eastern arena to direct the campaign, was present at one of the battles for possession of the Grodek line, French claim gains.

Further successes in northern France to the north of Arras as well as in Lorraine, and in the Vosges, were reported today by the French war office. In Lorraine, the capture of the German first line positions for a distance of nearly a mile is claimed. The fighting here was of unusual violence and it is said the German trenches were filled with dead.

DENES GREEK KING WOUNDED SLAIN, IS BURNED

Amsterdam, Holland, June 21.—Official that the king of Greece was either poisoned or stabbed, was made here Sunday on the return of Prof. Friedrich Kraus, a Berlin specialist, from the sickbed of the king of Greece. It had been reported the king had been attacked by the queen, who was a member of the German royal family as a result of differences regarding the attitude of Greece toward the European war.

Prof. Kraus said king Constantine suffered a natural illness, the first symptoms of which were those of influenza but which soon developed into pleurisy. He added:

"Owing to the general weakness of the patient, the Greek surgeon in attendance could not perform the operation of rib dissection but made only an incision in the chest. After this operation the king had a serious attack of weakness."

Dr. Kraus and Dr. Eisberg of Vienna remained with the king seven days. They found his condition better, but the opening was too small, his heart was also displaced. As the patient's condition improved the surgeon recommended resection of the rib. Accordingly a piece of the rib was removed and an extensive opening made for drainage.

The king bore the operation well, according to Dr. Kraus, and later smoked some cigarettes. This was followed by a high fever and an irritation of the kidneys and intestines and the condition of the heart and lungs gradually became almost normal. The internal trouble again proved obstinate.

The king was not yet out of danger when Dr. Kraus left, as his heart, owing to its displacement, was still weak and irregular.

GERMANY PAYS INDEMNITY FOR SPANIARDS KILLED

Madrid, Spain, June 21.—Germany has paid an indemnity of 150,000 marks for the lives of five Spaniards killed in the stage of Liege, Belgium, last August, and the Spanish government has declared the incident closed.
