ARCHITECTS WORK ON EXHIBIT

Chamber of Commerce Converted Into Exposition Hall; Opens Tuesday.

Carpenters were busy all day Sunday and Monday preparing the chamber of commerce building for the first annual exposition of the Southwestern Architects' association, which will be formally opened Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock by mayor Tom Lea.

Basement Filled With Exhibits

The basement of the chamber of commerce building was filled Sunday with crates, boxes and bundles of drawings and other exhibits for the exposition. Paints and rubs have also been placed in this exhibit hall and a special lighting scheme worked out so that the fine water color drawings and sketches may be seen to the best advantage.

San Francisco Exhibit

Another group of drawings which is expected to attract unusual attention at the exposition when it opens, is the work of Willis Post, the famous San Francisco architect. One is an oil painting of a residence in California, another of the U. S. Mills' bank of Sacramento, while another, considered one of the best of the group from an artistic point of view, is the Spring Valley water station, which furnishes water for San Francisco.

Civic Center Plans

A hotel in Vancouver is one of the largest framed drawings at the architects' show, having been drawn by Braunton and Leibert, who recently came to El Paso.

BISHOP SCHULER IS COMING TO EL PASO IN SEPTEMBER

Rev. Anthony J. Schuler, who has been made bishop of the El Paso diocese of the Roman Catholic church, is not expected to come here until September. He was formerly the pastor of the Holy Family chapel in El Paso, having been in charge of the parish for three years. Five years ago he was transferred to Denver, where he took charge of the Sacred Heart church. He will go to Rome, but will come from Denver to El Paso to take up his duties as bishop of El Paso as soon as he can close his affairs in Denver.

O'LEARY DEFENCE DEMANDS TRIAL

Would Clear Name of Man Charged with Complicity in Killing of Lecturer

Marshall, Tex., June 21.—Denial of a motion made by the state to dismiss the charge of murder against Frank O'Leary, one of five Marshall men indicted in connection with the killing here of Wm. Black, an anti-Catholic lecturer, marked the opening here today of the trial of O'Leary. Lack of sufficient evidence to convict was urged by the prosecution as ground for the dismissal, which was opposed by counsel for the defence who declared they desired to clear O'Leary's name.

Two Killed in Room

About supper time Black went to his hotel room where he was joined by the other members of his party, Clarence F. Hall of St. Paul, Minn., and Miss Sadie Black, a girl he had adopted at her home in Arkansas a few days previously. Three Marshall men, John Rogers, John Copeland and George Ryan called on the Black party. According to testimony at the examining trials all three called were members of the Knights of Columbus. They asked Black not to deliver his second lecture. Black replied he would deliver it. Shooting began and Black was shot near the heart and killed. Rogers also was killed and Copeland was shot three times.

DETAILS ARE MADE FOR ARMY RECRUITING SERVICE

Washington, D. C., June 21.—The following army orders have been issued: First Lieut. George B. Somerville, Third cavalry, is detailed for recruiting service and will proceed to Fort Logan, Colo. for duty. Maj. D. C. Howard, medical corps, is designated as consulting surgeon for the Red Cross hospital, Washington, D. C. Capt. U. G. Worrison, Eighteenth infantry, is detailed for recruiting service and will proceed to Columbus barracks, Ohio, for temporary duty, thence to Cincinnati for duty. Leaves of absence: Lieut. Col. Frederick Perkins, Twentieth infantry, two months and twenty-four days; Capt. E. A. Jensen, Twentieth infantry, two months; First Lieut. A. H. Acher, corps of engineers, two months; Capt. S. A. White, Tenth infantry, extended twelve days.

LIQUOR DEALERS TO ASSIST IN ENFORCING EXCISE LAW

The El Paso Liquor Dealers' Protective association will cooperate with the city administration in every way to secure strict observance of all excise laws. This was decided upon at a meeting of the association held Sunday. Attention was called to the fact that some of the smaller saloons in the southern part of the city were selling liquor on Sunday and not strictly observing closing hours and that this was working a harm on the saloons that observed the law. The association was formed about a year ago. Recently members of the association called upon mayor Tom Lea and assured him of the association's entire support in the observance of the excise regulations. The association is now securing more members and will hold a number of Sunday meetings to discuss conditions in the trade here.

W. H. RAND, NOTED PUBLISHER, DIES

Was Head of Big Eastern House; Helped Organize Linotype Company.

New Canadian, Conn., June 21.—William H. Rand, for many years head of the printing and publishing house of Rand, McNally & Co. died here Sunday night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Henry W. Chapell. He had been ill for some time.

Founded Printing House

In 1849 he joined the gold rush to California, making the voyage around Cape Horn. His laboring and mining brought small success and, after about a year of them, he returned to his trade as a printer and, in partnership with the late John A. Lewis, of Boston, established the first newspaper in southern California, the Los Angeles Star. Returning to Boston, he established a printing business in that city, and in 1855 married Harriet Robinson, of Bath, Me. Mrs. Rand died in 1905.

Organized Linotype Company

In 1885 he, with Whitlaw Field, Melville E. Stone, Silston Hutchings, W. H. Smith and others, organized the syndicate which brought to perfection the type or matrix setting machine, known as the Mercantile Linotype, and it was Mr. Rand who suggested the expressive name of that wonderful machine. Mr. Rand was widely known and much respected and beloved in Chicago for his philanthropy and public spirit. He was a lover of painting, of books and chiefly of flowers, and took and gave much pleasure from his garden and greenhouses.
