

"EXPERT SELECTIONS" ALSO FEELS DOWN "CONSENSUS" ALSO FEELS DOWN

Wager of \$5 on Each "To Win" Selection of 11 Racing Experts in Week Would Have Netted Loss of \$181.25. Though Experts Have Far More Knowledge of Conditions in Racing than Average Bettor.

NEW YORK, June 24.—If you only bet on putting on the ponies it might be well for you to take a squint at the table below which will give you a tip-off on the long chances you take in winning.

The table shows just what happened to the 25 selections made during the week of June 7 to June 13 by each of the 11 most famous newspaper racing authorities in the United States.

Each day each expert chose a horse to win in each of the six races. That made a total of 36 selections. The table shows how many selections were correct and how many selections were wrong.

You will notice from the above table that if each of the 11 experts had bet on their own 25 selections throughout the week only four of them would have won and seven would have lost.

Every one of the 11 men knows the racing game from every angle. They have followed it for years in their newspaper capacity. They know the pedigrees, the past performances, the ability and the characteristics of practically every horse that runs.
