

FIRST YEAR OF WAR HAS CLOSED

Resume of 12 Months of Hostilities Show Tragic Results in Europe.

New York, June 25.—One year ago the Austrian archduke, Francis Ferdinand, and his wife were shot and killed in the little Bosnian town of Sarajevo by Garvilo Princip.

The sinking in this manner of the Cunard liner Lusitania with the loss of more than 100 American lives precipitated a request upon the part of the United States that such practice insofar as they might menace Americans be stopped.

Germany has been driven from the far east. A part of the Dardanelles is in the possession of the allied troops.

Portions of France and Russia are in the possession of German troops. A strip of Alsace has been taken from Germany.

On the continent of Africa parts of territorial possessions have been lost by both sides.

Various island possessions of Germany have been taken by the forces of the allies.

Italian troops are in possession of a strip of Austrian territory.

Heavy losses on sea.

The outstanding results at sea are these: German and Austrian merchant shipping has been driven from all the open seas.

German and Austrian war vessels having a total displacement of approximately 257,000 tons, have been destroyed.

War vessels of the allied nations having a total displacement of approximately 322,000 tons have been sent to the bottom.

The greater portions of the German and allied fleets in the North sea remain intact.

CONSTANTINOPLE IS NOT CUT OFF

Steamers Carrying War Munitions Still Ply Marmora Sea to Gallipoli.

Constantinople, Turkey, June 25.—Turkish steamers still run by the sea of Marmora from Constantinople to Gallipoli and Chank, maintaining the activity of the British submarines.

The sinking of submarines is very strong among the Turkish sailors, and the steamers bound for the fighting zone sail away from their docks at odd hours, generally midnight or later with a squad of sharpshooters.
