\$305,967,965.14 IS TOTAL ASSESSMENT IN NEW MEXICO

Santa Fe, N. M., Oct. 1.—The total taxable assessment of New Mexico is \$305,967,965.14, according to the figures given out by the state tax commission. This is a net rate of \$11.71, or \$1.24 over the figures returned by the county assessors, consisting of a general rate of \$15,017,819.66; the addition of omitted property found by special agents of the commission amounting to \$4,324,159.63. The appraisals allowed reduced the total \$44,515.28. The increase is \$12,000,000 over last year.

Based on an average collection of 83 percent, the amount of state taxes collected will be \$277,223.11, leaving an estimated deficit of \$28,000. However, if 92 percent are collected, there will be no deficit. So it is up to the county tax collectors.

GRAND JURY CALLS GRAHAM COUNTY HOSPITAL DISGRACE

Safford, Ariz., Oct. 1.—In a report on conditions in the Graham county hospital, the grand jury declared conditions in the hospital "incredibly bad." "We your undersigned committee," Concerning the hospital, the grand jury submitted a report of the committee of investigation, which said: "We your undersigned committee, appointed to examine and report as to the condition of the county hospital of Graham county, respectfully report that we visited and examined said hospital as completely and minutely as possible, consulting the patients therein also, and we advisedly and emphatically declare to you that the condition of that hospital is indescribably, intolerably and incredibly bad. It is, in our opinion and belief, a menace to the health of this community, a shame and burning disgrace to this whole country, if not to the state of Arizona."

NO MOSQUITOES HERE. "One of the things I am impressed with in this section of Texas," said state health officer W. R. Collins, of Austin, "is the lack of mosquitoes. In the eastern sections of the state, especially close to the Louisiana line, the mosquitoes are a heavy factor against the general comfort and health of the communities. The dry conditions keep the insects hundreds of miles away. In some mosquito sections I have seen the natives skilled to cover their heads with netting for protection."
