


A MOTORCYCLE MACHINE GUN



HERE is the latest fighting unit to be added to the New York militia. Under Capt. Lorillard Spencer, commanding the eighth coast defense command, a volunteer squad of about 400 men with motorcycles has been formed and will be seen for the first time in maneuvers on Saturday at Van Cortlandt park, New York, when 10,000 of the National guard troops will be mobilized for review by governor Charles S. Whitman. All of the motorcycles carry side cars in which armed men are rushed from one point to another. A side car ambulance and a side car machine gun, here pictured, are also parts of the unit. The corps has not yet been attached to the militia and is made up solely of volunteers who own their machines.
