TELETONS DANCE SLOWLY

Italy's Declaration Of War Increases Hopes Of The Allied Forces.

GERMANS MAKE OFFENSIVE MOVE
Illness Of Premier Asquith Brings Lull In England's Political Activities.

PETROGRAD, Russia, Oct. 20.—An imperial manifesto declaring war against Bulgaria appeared today under date of October 18. It was accompanied by a communication reviewing the friendly services of Russia for Bulgaria in the past and pointing out the "treachery" of King Ferdinand.

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 20.—Latest reports from the near east indicate that Serbia is in deadly danger of being overwhelmed by the armies of her neighbor. No less than eight Bulgarian forces have crossed into Serbian territory.

Italy's Declaration Increases Hopes.
Italy's declaration of war against Bulgaria increases the hopes of her allies that she will join in the Balkan campaign.

Reports from the western front indicate that the Germans have been reinforced heavily and are showing clear intention to resume the offensive.

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MEXICAN CHIEF WILL RETAIN POWER

Says He Doesn't Wish To Be Approved As President.

GENERAL TALKS TO NEWSPAPER MEN.—Elections Will Not Be Held Until Peace Is Entirely Restored to Mexico.

STRIKERS PROTECT PROPERTY OF THE MINES IN CLIFTON DISTRICT

Throw Out Strong Picket Lines to Prevent Damage to Property by Outsiders; Big Parade of Strikers Held to Disprove Reports That Many of the Strikers Have Left; Finance Committee is Increased.

BY ERNEST DOUGLAS, Special Correspondent. CLIFTON, Ariz., Oct. 20.—Two hundred pickets were thrown about the Arizona Copper company's smelter, a mile south of Clifton, last night and the picket guards about all other mine works in the district have been strengthened.

Strike Refugees Form Tent Colony.—Duncan, Ariz., Oct. 20.—Mine and smelter foremen, shift bosses and other officials of higher and lower positions from the Clifton-Morenci-Metalf strike district, have formed a tent colony in the center of town.

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PROHIBITION APPLIES TO FACTORIES OPPOSED TO GOVERNMENT RECOGNIZED BY U.S.

PRESIDENT SIGNS SPECIAL ORDER.—Violation Of Embargo Punishable By Fine Not To Exceed \$10,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 20.—President Wilson today declared an embargo on the shipment of arms and ammunition to Mexico.

President Wilson signed a supplementary order, however, which excepts Gen. Carranza's government from the embargo and permits munitions to go through to him unhindered.

The president's proclamation, which was issued when the revolution was against Madero.

Violation of the embargo is punishable by a fine of not to exceed \$10,000 or imprisonment for not more than two years, or both.

The proclamation is the result of the recognition of the Carranza government, which was formally given yesterday. This places all other Mexican factions in the attitude of being insurgents against the recognized government of that country.

CARRANZA REPRESENTATIVE LEAVES.—Eliso Arredondo, personal representative of Carranza, was preparing today to leave for Saltillo, where he will personally convey to Gen. Carranza letters of recognition from the government of the United States and the South and Central American republics. He expects to depart within the next 48 hours.

WHOLESALE EXPORTATION ORDER.—The order for an exception to the embargo in favor of the Carranza government was contained in a letter from President Wilson to Secretary McAdoo. It follows in part:

"An exception is hereby made to the prohibition against exports created by the order of the United States customs department, through the United States customs house the munitions for the recognized de facto government of Mexico or for industrial or commercial use within the limits of the territory as above set forth.

"An embargo will be placed against the border ports in the states of Chihuahua and Sonora, as well as all ports in the territory of Lower California, whether or not controlled by the de facto government of Mexico, and you will instruct the appropriate collectors of customs and other officers of the treasury department.

The Villa Agency has closed its doors today. It was announced that in view of the recognition of Gen. Carranza there was no further need for maintaining it.

Secretary Lansing's note, officially notifying Arredondo of the recognition of the Carranza government, has been made public.

Lansing's Letter.—Secretary Lansing's note of recognition referred only to the intention to accredit an ambassador soon. Its text was as follows: "My dear Mr. Arredondo: "It is my pleasure to inform you that the president of the United States takes the opportunity of extending recognition to the de facto government of Mexico of which General Venustiano Carranza is the chief executive.

"The government of the United States will be pleased to receive formally in Washington a diplomatic representative of the de facto government as soon as it shall please General Carranza to designate and appoint (Continued on Page 2, Col. 4.)
