

ALL DEALERS ARE COOPERATING TO MAKE AUTO SHOW SUCCESS

Quick Tire Changing Is One of the Features Arranged for Special Entertainment of Visitors; Parades Day and Night Are Planned; Efforts Are Being Made to Secure Suitable Prizes for Contestants.

WITH every automobile, accessory and tire dealer in El Paso cooperating, the success of "El Paso Automobile Week," which opens on November 23 and closes on December 4, is assured.

Not only will the visitors have a chance to inspect the latest models of more than 20 different makes of automobiles, but they will also have a chance to see how to make small repairs, change tires and other things which are of deep interest to the average motorist.

At least one of the prizes, the Motorist, will arrange so that visitors can go through the shops and watch the rebuilding and reconstruction of cars. It is likely that manager George Bailey will assign a man to act as guide for the visitors and describe the different work which may be done at any of the time they are in the shops.

The tire dealers are busy figuring out some advice stunts for the entertainment of the visitors. One suggestion which has reached the automobile editor is that a series of tire changing contests be staged that week, and the idea may be adopted.

A recent tire changing contest at Sacramento, Cal., resulted in some very speedy work and considerable excitement, and it would doubtless prove interesting here.

Considerable rivalry aroused. "Slick" a member of one of the Quick Tire Service crews, and known along gasoline row as "the negro Char," is likely to have very plausible claim if any tire changing contest is arranged.

It is a cinch that he will win it, but some of the other service boys are equally as certain that "Slick" and his "come when, come when" won't be in it when the division of the prizes gets around.

They all admit, however, that "Slick" can slip a customer's tire into his capacious pocket quicker than any other boy in town.

Also that he can lead the parade when it comes to the party ride, so it is fair to predict that "Slick" will be dolled up in his "evenings-to-visit" suit all week.

Publicity Campaign Is Started. The publicity department of the El Paso chamber of commerce has already started the publicity campaign in other cities in the El Paso trade district and arrangements for excursion rates on all railroads running into El Paso are under way.

Big Parades Day and Night. While the plans call for one big parade only, it is likely that certain of the dealers and accessory men will arrange for parades every night. The accessory houses are all handling dinners and headlight which they desire to demonstrate to the visitors.

Efforts are to be made to secure suitable prizes for the best decorated show rooms and also for the best decorated cars in the big parade which will likely be held on the Saturday afternoon or night of "Automobile Week."

COFFEY Makes Poor Showing With Moran. Has Fighting Instinct But Poor Jaw.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—James Coffey, the Irish giant, made a poor fight on the occasion of his last appearance in a New York ring—a very poor fight indeed.

Previously he battered old Jim Moran, in Park, July 4, 1914. The decision went to the black man in 20 rounds, and we are now informed by those interested in Moran that Johnson was better that day than he was in Cuba against Willard. If he wasn't he was pretty bad, but just the same Moran's failure to whip Jack in 20 rounds is not going to inspire any confidence in his chances if he ever meets Willard. At the end of the 20th round in Havana Willard was away out in front.

Moran is supposed to be a good boxer and a crafty fighter. He is a very intelligent fellow—away above the average, in fact. He can punch—probably not as hard as Coffey, but hard enough to displace the Irishman's fragile jaw if he gets it within his range. Al Reich rocked Coffey, and so did Jim Flynn, both smashes to the jaw, and had Reich been more aggressive and quicker to see his advantage he might have knocked Coffey kicking.

Not that we are underrating or making small of Jim Flynn, understand. Not for worlds would we do that. But we do not believe that any man Jim Flynn can paste as he pasted J. Coffey has any chance looking for a championship.

Wants to Arrange for Champion to Fight a 10-Round Mill in New York.

Jim Willard, heavyweight champion of the world, will receive an offer of \$200,000 to defend his title in a 10 round bout at Madison Square Garden.

Billy Gibson, the Bronx Impresario, who has taken over the boxing management of the Garden, is after big game, and he will try to get Willard to box Frank Moran, who defeated Jim Coffey recently.

The Coffey-Moran exhibition was arranged by William H. Wellman, the retiring manager of Madison Square Garden. One of the rules of the State Athletic Commission forbids an official of any club from managing a boxer who takes part in an exhibition before his club. Gibson is Jim Coffey's mentor.

Nothing But Big Bouts. Gibson has already applied to chairman Fred A. Wenex of the state commission for a renewal of the show corporation's license, which expired on Sept. 20, and he expects the application will be favorably acted upon.

It is Gibson's intention to stage the biggest bouts available in Madison Square Garden. He has not yet had time to straighten out affairs in his newly acquired position, one which he vacated about a year ago, after serving in it for two years, but when he gets matters cleared up he will begin making offers to the champions. One bout which Gibson has in view and which should appeal to boxing fans was a bring together "Kid" Williams of Baltimore, bantamweight champion of the world, and Johnny Ertle, the western boy who claimed the title after getting a decision recently from Williams on a foul.

The new manager may also try to match Willie Ritchie and Freddie Welsh. He has many plans in view but he stated last night that he could not announce them until later.

OTERO HIGH SCHOOL PLAYS CRUCES TEAM. Alamogordo, N. M., Oct. 22.—The football team of the Otero county high school left here this morning, for four automobiles, for Las Cruces, where a return game will be played this afternoon against the Las Cruces high school team.

M'CAMMANT CALLS OFF BALL SERIES CAN'T LINE UP DESIRED PLAYERS

Lack of Gillette and Meason Weakens Proposed Civilian All-Stars and Project Is Abandoned; Winter Series of Army League Starts Next Thursday With Six Clubs and Double Header Scheduled; 3 Games a Week.

ABILITY to secure the desired players has resulted in Dr. J. T. McCamant calling off the proposed series between an all-star team of his selection and the Army League all-stars, which was called to start on Tuesday afternoon of next week at Rio Grande Park.

The doctor wanted to use Billy Meason at third base and "Dutch" Nagle in the outfield; Medina as an infielder and Weeks a Mexican twirler, who has been with one of the small town teams near here all summer. He also planned to have "Bus" Gillette as one of his pitchers.

The doctor did not want to pitch as he believed he did not get a square deal by being refused a chance in the city series. Billy Meason was offered a good job in Arizona and left Wednesday night. Nagle had not qualified for the series as outfielders had to play 10 games in the Commercial League. Medina was also short of the required number of games, while Weeks had not played any games here this year.

Soldiers Were Willing. The soldiers were willing to waive the qualifications for Weeks, Medina and Nagle, but without Gillette and Meason, the doctor had doubts as to the real strength of his team. Professional demands for his services have been heavy and he decided that it would be better to drop the plan for the time being and the series was called off on Thursday afternoon.

On Sunday, the all-star Army team will play the first Shelton-Faynes at Rio Grande park. The Mexicans beat the soldiers last Saturday, 4 to 3, and manager Juan Gomez asserts that they will repeat the trick next Sunday, even with Graham on the mound for the all-stars. Villarreal, who pitched a great game last week, will work for the Mexicans.

Winter League Starts Thursday. The winter league for the army teams will get under way at Rio Grande park on Thursday afternoon of next week with two seven-inning games. The league will consist of six clubs, two more than were in the summer league. The 15th cavalry has gone to the Philippines but has been replaced by the eighth cavalry, which will enter a team. The fourth field artillery, which claims to be a wonderfully fast baseball team, will join, as will the seventh infantry, another new arrival here. The 39th infantry, 14th infantry and sixth infantry were all in the original league.

Three Doubleheaders Weekly. The plans call for doubleheaders three days a week. Games will be played Thursday, Saturday and Sunday of next week and Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday thereafter.

Opening day will likely see the fourth field artillery playing the eighth cavalry, while the 29th infantry, city champions, will likely meet the seventh infantry the same afternoon. Good ball was played in the Army league this summer and the fans are (Continued on Next Page)
