

CARRANZA AGENT HAS NO STANDING

Villa Attorney Says Belligerency Only Recognized, Claims Chihuahua.

The right of the Cedar Hill Coal and Coke company to intervene in the application of Andres Garcia, Carranza consul in El Paso, for a temporary restraining order to move Mexican National cars into Mexico, was argued before Judge P. R. Price in the first district court Saturday morning.

In the contention for right to intervene, Gunther Lessing, for the coal company, set forth that the court has no jurisdiction in the matter of interstate shipments. He pointed out that consul Garcia and the Carranza government have no rights in the mat-

ter, inasmuch as the United States has only recognized the belligerency of Carranza, and has not recognized Carranza as to the possession of Chihuahua and other northern states.

The Villa faction, he claims, is in possession of these states by right of force and as such, under international law, must be recognized. He pointed out that in putting in effect a temporary restraining order, pending the hearing, the court is depriving the company of transportation of its coal destined for Mexico, involving the paying of demurrage.

CHARGED WITH PARTICIPATION IN THE DEATH OF MADERO

Carrancista address from Mexico City Saturday state Lieut. J. M. Ruiz, said to have been a member of the federal squad which arrested president Francisco I. Madero prior to his execution, was taken in custody Friday by Carranza troops. He was to be court-martialed, it is said.

VILLA MUST KEEP OVER THE LINE

United States Troops Ready to Drive Back His Men From Invasion.

ed through American territory will have crossed the border to Agua Prieta before morning.

Conditions at Cananea are reported improved. General Urbalejo, the Villa commander, it is said, has promised to protect railroad and copper company property, upon the condition that work be resumed at the earliest possible moment.

Watching Old 'Nigger Head.' 'Nigger Head,' a black turtle faintly resembling the cranial outline of an Ethiopian, which rises out of the desert nine miles east of here, claimed the attention of all eyes today as marking the portal of a mountain pass through which Gen. Villa was expected to swing tonight or tomorrow.

Villa is reported to have 24 field pieces of unbroken calibre and efficiency and 500 men. To oppose him, Gen. P. Elias Calles, the Carranza commander, has approximately 3700 troops here at present, ten pieces of artillery and between 20 and 30 machine guns.

Gen. Villa's army today reached the Calladillo ranch, some 18 miles southeast of Agua Prieta in Bernardino valley, just on the border of the Chiricahua mountains. This placed him on a fairly easy march to the barred wire entanglements of the Carranza Calles elaborate system of defenses.

Trenches Are Extended. Although already possessed of a fairly labyrinthine system of protective works, Gen. Calles had his men employ their final waiting hours today adding masses of trenches and redoubts.

One of the Carranza soldiers also attacked a Yaqui detachment near Anavacachi pass, 12 miles west of Agua Prieta. According to reports from the headquarters of Calles, the Yaquis were defeated.

Gen. Calles reported officially today that 20 men were killed in the Villa advance guard and that he scattered more than a thousand after capturing 12. The prisoners were brought to Agua Prieta. Carranza officials said the men admitted Villa's army is in bad shape. They said the soldiers actually were starving and mutinous and that the condition of the women and children in the camp was unfortunate.

San Antonio, Tex., Oct. 28.—Upon receipt of advices from Douglas that the United States troops there were deemed sufficient to preserve neutrality in the event that Villa forces attempted to cross the American border, Maj. Gen. Pershing, commanding the southern department, said he would not leave for the west.

the development of a situation here paralleling that at Douglas at this time.

Excitement Quite General. Before troops received reinforcements, there was considerable activity in the Guadalupe earthen, across the river from Fabosa, and El Paso train got a bit excited. The Guadalupe activity was taken as a forecast that the Carranza train was to be attacked when it passed that vicinity. The railroad was carefully guarded all night by United States troops.

There are probably less than 200 soldiers in Juarez now, with no artillery. There are half a hundred enlisted musicians, but without arms for fighting.

Gen. Manuel Ochoa is in command of the small garrison, and his chief of staff is Lieut. Col. Jose de la Paz.

Garcia Hears of Plot. Mexican consul Andres G. Garcia, of El Paso, Friday night telegraphed Washington of receipt of a report that a Villista attempt would be made to blow up Carrancista troop trains on the way to Douglas somewhere close to Columbus, N. M.

Villa Soldiers See Troops Leave. The first troop received the Carranza reinforced army departed from the Union station at 2:15 o'clock.

Conductor G. L. Archer, of the Mexico North Western passenger train service, arrived in Juarez on the train from Casas Grandes Friday evening and reported that he had talked with Charles Boone, the American cattlemen reported shot at Guzman.

Conductor Archer says he had a talk with Boone at Casas Grandes Friday morning. Boone was very much alive and well. He told conductor Arthur that two mules had been stolen from him, but had been returned by the Villa officers.

The report that Boone had been shot by Villa men was brought to the border by James Welch, who claimed to have seen Boone shot down in front of the Guzman station and says he escaped by hiding in the locomotive.

ROSALIO HERNANDEZ REPORTED CAPTURED. Gen. Rosalio Hernandez, former Villa general and one of Villa's strongest men in the campaign against Carranza, has been captured at Juarez by Villa troops, according to a message received in Juarez from the border by way of Presidio and El Paso Saturday.

Gen. Hernandez quit Villa about six weeks ago and announced that he would retire from the field.

MEXICAN HERALD SUPPRESSED BY CARRANCISTAS, IS REPORT. Galveston, Tex., Oct. 28.—According to advices received by the Carranza representative here, the Mexican Herald of Mexico City, a consistent antagonist to the revolution and a warm supporter of Huerta, was suppressed last night by Constitutional authorities.

CARRANZA SAYS U. S. CANNOT REPRESENT OTHER NATIONS. Washington, D. C., Oct. 28.—With the object of hastening certain foreign governments in recognizing the de facto government in Mexico, Gen. Carranza has given notice that hereafter he will not recognize the United States as the representative of any other foreign government.

FUNERAL HELD FOR FORMER SALT LAKE POLICE CHIEF

The funeral of T. H. Hilton, butcher for Swift & Co., and a member of the El Paso Mormon colony, was held Saturday morning at 10 o'clock from the Peak Undertaking company chapel.

Interment was made in Concordia cemetery. Mr. Hilton was 58 years of age and at one time was chief of police of Salt Lake City.

ARMY OFFICERS WITH STATE GUARD MAY RIDE WITHOUT COST

Austin, Tex., Oct. 28.—It was held today by the attorney general's department that army officers attached to the Texas national guard or on duty with the state militia, and acting under orders of the governor, who is commander-in-chief of the guard, are entitled to free railroad transportation when traveling over the state in the discharge of their duties.

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
