

NEW BISHOP BLESSES CHILDREN SCATTER FLOWERS IN PATHWAY

New Bishop of El Paso Arrives From Denver and Given Highest Honors; Holds Mass for His Own Devotion; Asks Prayers of El Paso People to Aid Him in Work; Banquet in Honor Tonight; Instalation Thursday.

RIGHT REV. A. J. SCHULER, S. J., bishop of El Paso, arrived in the city at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning from Denver, where he was consecrated by Very Rev. J. E. Pitaval, archbishop of Santa Fe, and was accompanied by that dignitary. The newly created bishop was met at the station by the clergy of the new diocese and a group of El Paso business men, with

Vincent B. Andrea, grand master of the Knights of Columbus, as the general chairman.

Message to El Paso. Asked if he had a formal message for the people of El Paso, bishop Schuler smiled and replied that it was the last thing in the world for him to be formal. "Tell the people of El Paso for me," he said, "that I appreciate greatly the welcome that they have extended to me and that I am very grateful to them for it. It is an evidence of their loyalty and devotion to what I have meant to them in the past when I was a priest here, and I take it as an evidence of what I will be to them in the future in the newer work that I am to do as their bishop."

Mexicans Being Flowers. As bishop Schuler passed through the union station many Mexican women with flowers in their arms pushed forward to welcome him and kneel before him that is so significant of his episcopacy. The bishop was gracious in this act of recognition and he could not escape the pleasure of giving recognition to these eager and waiting women.

Holds Mass. Immediately following the ceremony of the children, bishop Schuler withdrew to a special room and said for him in the hospital and donning his purple vestments entered the chapel and held a mass for his own devotion. This first service in El Paso was only attended by members of the clergy and sisters of the hospital, as well as a few of the Catholic Knights and Knights of Columbus.

Holiday Thursday. The schools represented in the song and flower school were St. Joseph's academy, St. Mary's school, Sacred Heart school, St. Ignatius school and the Ursulin Angel school. A general holiday was extended to the school children on Thursday that they might celebrate the priest's elevation to the episcopacy.

Banquet Tonight. Tonight at the Paso del Norte hotel a banquet has been arranged in honor of bishop Schuler and the Very Rev. J. E. Pitaval. The arrangement committee for this event is in the hands of Vincent B. Andrea. Thursday morning bishop William Shaw, of San Antonio, and bishop Francisco Urzanga, of Simons, and bishop Joseph E. Ruffini, of El Paso, will be present at the solemn pontifical mass which marks the final ceremonial in the elevation of the newly created bishop.

Distinguished Clergymen. Rev. David O'Dwyer, of St. Patrick's church, of North Denver, accompanied bishop Schuler from Denver and will preach the sermon at the pontifical mass. Another distinguished guest and

GEN. HOWE DIES IN WASHINGTON

Father of Walter D. Howe and Brother of Mrs. F. E. Hunter; Indian Fighter.

Brig. Gen. Walter Howe, retired, died at his home in Washington, D. C., Monday morning. He was the father of Walter D. Howe, of El Paso, who left here Sunday afternoon to be at the bedside of his father, but failed to arrive there in time to see him before his death. Gen. Howe was also a brother of Mrs. F. E. Hunter, of El Paso.

In the death of Gen. Howe the army has lost another distinguished officer. In the Indian wars in the Philippines and in the old west Gen. Howe made promotion after promotion until he was retired on December 31, 1910, as a brigadier general. He visited his son Ben when he returned from the Philippine campaign and has kept in close touch with El Paso since his son came here to locate after graduating from the law department of the University of Indiana. Gen. Howe's family home is in Indiana.

Notified Gen. Howe's Family. When Gen. Howe's death was announced the Little Big Horn was fought and his entire command was killed. It was Gen. Howe, then commanding in the west, who had to tell Mrs. Howe and the wives of the officers of the fate of their husbands. Gen. Howe especially distinguished himself in the Philippines and was mentioned a number of times in his war department records for valor in action.

Born in Indiana. Gen. Howe was born in Bloomington, Ind., December 21, 1848, and was the son of James Montgomery and Mary Graham Howe. He graduated from the United States Military academy at West Point in 1872. On September 21, 1878, he was married to Miss Elizabeth Dunn, of Bloomington, Ind. She survives him, as do three sons, Walter H. Howe is a practicing lawyer here; Alfred is a lieutenant in the United States army, and George is professor in a college at Colorado Springs, Colo.

In Artillery. Upon graduation Gen. Howe became a second lieutenant in the Fourth artillery, and served as first lieutenant, captain, major and lieutenant colonel of artillery until 1899, when he was appointed colonel of the 41st infantry volunteers, and went in command of the regiment to the Philippine islands, where he was commander of the provinces of Alby and Sorogon.

He participated in the Philippine islands he had participated in the Meade war in 1872, and the Powder river expedition under Gen. Crook in 1876. After his return from the Philippines islands in Mar. 1894 he became a colonel of artillery, and on January 11, 1910, became brigadier general in the regular army, retiring on account of age, December 31, 1910.

BRIG. GEN. HOWE WILL BE BURIED IN ARLINGTON

Washington, D. C., Nov. 16.—Arrangements are completed for the funeral of Brig. Gen. Walter Howe, U. S. A., retired, who died here Monday from ailments incident to old age. Interment will be in Arlington National cemetery Thursday with full military honors.

Gen. Howe was actively engaged in the suppression of Indian uprisings in the Indian wars and in service in the Philippines. He was a native of Indiana.
