MOTOR DEALERS REPORT SALES AS A RESULT OF THE BIG SHOW

Visitors Throng Exhibition Rooms and Express Pleasure in Various Displays; Some Dealers Report Losing Sales Because of Being Unable to Make Immediate Deliveries; Would Buy Demonstrators.

VISITORS were plentiful along gasoline row Friday morning and "El Paso Automobile Week" took on a rather festive appearance. The parade this evening has brought in the visitors from out of town and many El Pasoans were also in the automobile district, paying visits to the different show rooms and inspecting the exhibits.

Not until Thursday afternoon did the out of town visitors begin to put in an appearance in anything like large numbers. The visitors evidently held back until late in the week so that they could find all exhibits complete and also be able to take in the big parade. The overall offices reported many visitors on Thursday and sales manager L. E. Gillett said their staff was busy caring for visitors all afternoon. Among the out of town visitors who registered at the overall offices were: E. K. McNeill, La Mesa, N. M.; F. R. Kelly, Los Angeles; William Whelan and L. C. The Elliott-Garrett company is not keeping a register of the many visitors, but among the out of town dealers who looked over the Studebaker and Wichita displays on Thursday was John W. Price, Studebaker dealer at Midland, who was accompanied by Charles M. Dublin. Other visitors noticed at the Elliott-Garrett rooms were V. Hogan, a business man of Sierra Blanca; Leo Brenham, of Carrizozo, and C. A. Goldsmith, of Midland.

Many Visitors at Neuman's. C. D. Neuman asserts that to keep track of the visitors at the Neuman Motor Sales company's display would be the job for two clerks. The running stripped Heo chassis in the window is a real magnet when it comes to drawing the crowds there was a constant stream of visitors going around this machine.

The Cadillac Sales company also has a stripped chassis on view. It has stripped down an Oldsmobile, and placed a big motor beneath the motor so that every operation may be seen. The transmission is open and parts of the cylinders removed so that every movable part of the car is seen.

Miniature Automobile Track. Another moving exhibit is at the El Paso Speedometer service station on West San Antonio street. Here a miniature automobile race track has been built and tiny automobiles, operated by electricity, race around the course at speeds which would indicate a desire to smash some of the records of Rosa, Cooper or Clifford arranged around the track are master carburetors and various accessories turned out by the Stewart-Warner corporation. It is an exhibit in an attractive one and is drawing good crowds.

Lucas Star Sells Five Cars. The Lucas Star Motor company reports good business for the week. Up to Thursday night it had sold three Dodge touring cars, one Hupmobile sedan and one Chalmers touring car since Monday. Whether all this business was created by "El Paso Automobile Week" is a problem, but president E. G. Perry gives

part of the credit to the show and the rest to an energetic sales staff. The Southern Motor company is "at home" this afternoon, according to the women visitors. Carnations are given to all members of the fair sex who visit the 27th avenue sales room and manager David S. Russak heads the "receiving line." The specially painted Hupvas cars are getting a lot of attention from the women, most of whom go into ecstasies over the white roadster. This car will be shown in tonight's parade with some very elaborate floral decorations.

Many Visit Clements. Many of the out of town accessory and tire dealers have accepted the invitation of Ben L. Clements to make their headquarters while in town at the Borden building. Clements' sales room and Mr. Clements and his staff are busy living up to their reputation as courteous salesmen.

Want Immediate Deliveries. One of the big "bugaboos" with which the dealers have to contend this week is that many of the out of town visitors want to buy their cars and get immediate delivery and cannot understand why the dealers prefer to lose a sale rather than part with their demonstrators. One Myrtle avenue dealer lost two sales Thursday because he would not give up at once two models which he has been using for demonstrators. The fact that there will be a shipment in from the factory in two weeks would not satisfy the would-be buyers.

See the Parade. Tonight's big event is the parade. It forms at Piedras and Montana streets at 7:45 o'clock and at least 700 cars of all makes and descriptions are expected to take part. The parade will come down town by way of Mesa avenue, go through the business district and return north to Wyoming street, where it will disband. Everybody in El Paso who has a car is invited to put it in the parade.

After the parade, there will be "big doings" in every show room in the city and those who come downtown for the parade are invited to visit the different show rooms before going home.


JENNINGS SAYS HE IS SATISFIED WITH DETROIT

It was intimated at the local Federal league offices that the New York Federal league club had made Baker an offer.

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BUENOS AIRES PLANNING BATTLES

\$125,000 is Being Raised to Finance Championship Fights of Big Caliber.

New York, Dec. 2.—Millions of South American sportsmen are planning a pugilistic carnival to be held at Buenos Aires, next spring, in which the four best champions of the world will be contested. Within the next two weeks the sum of \$125,000 will be deposited in a local bank to be divided later into four purses and the additional sum of \$75,000 to cover traveling, training and advertising expenses of pugilists and promoters.

The bouts are outlined will bring together Jess Willard and the best heavyweight that can be obtained; the champion middleweights, Mike Gibbons of St. Paul, and Lesie Darcy.

The new manager is none other than Johnny's mother. According to reports from the west, when Coulon recently returned from a long trip to Canada, where he went to regain his health, he was met at the railroad station by his mother, who "climbed" with him, hugged him, cornered, then boldly asked: "What are your plans in the boxing game?" Needless to say, Johnny, who had announced his retirement from the ring, was taken by surprise, and after catching his breath, answered: "Well, I'm going to start right in training again, and I'll bring back the world's bantamweight championship to the Coulon family." Mrs. Coulon eyed Johnny for a while and then said: "Well, Johnny, what if you find that you cannot win back that championship?" Johnny didn't have an answer ready for this question, but his mother readily supplied it: "I'll tell you, Johnny. I'm going to be your manager, and if you show me in your next bout that you no longer have the strength you showed when you were a champion, then your manager will make you throw in the sponge and quit the game for good. It all depends on your next bout."

WILLARD WILL FIGHT FULTON

Battle is to Be Held March 4, Twenty Rounds for the Championship.

New Orleans, La., Dec. 2.—Though the news was expected, fight fans today discussed with great interest an announcement of Thursday night that Jess Willard and Fred Fulton will meet here March 4 in a 20 round bout for the world's heavyweight championship. The announcement came from Burns and Tetterton, promoters of the match. Willard signed articles here several weeks ago to meet any white fighter the promoters might name by December 18. Efforts were made to arrange an elimination bout between Fulton and Frank Moran, of Pittsburgh, but, according to the promoters, Moran refused to meet the Minnesota pugilist and was notified that if he did not agree by December 1 to do so, the match would be given to Fulton. Fulton previously had signed articles to meet Willard in the event Moran refused the elimination bout.

Willard's contract calls for \$12,500, win, loss or draw. Terms arranged with Fulton were not announced. Fulton has 34 knockouts. Fulton has been boxing about two years and in his 25 fights is credited with 24 knockouts. Among the fighters who took the count were Jack Morgan, Jack Lewis, Tim Lounan, Arthur Pelker and Andre Anderson. Sporting men pointed out that physically Fulton compares favorably with the champion. His fighting weight is about 220 pounds, as against Willard's 240. Although Willard's height of six feet six inches is greater by two inches than those of the Rochester fighter, Fulton's reach of 54 1/2 inches is longer by one inch and one-half than that of the Kansas, and is said to be the greatest of any living boxer. Arena Not Selected. The promoters stated that neither the officials nor arena in which the fight is to be held have been selected. Willard and Fulton expect to establish training camps in New Orleans about a month before the fight, it was said.
