

K., Z. & M. TO BUILD ADDITION; \$60,000 ENLARGEMENT TO STORE

Solid Block of Reinforced Concrete For Wholesale and Retail Hardware Store; Gus Zork Buys Building Site For \$80,000; Warehouse Will Cost \$15,000; Barns Are to Be Constructed For Gen. Angeles.

KRAKAUER, Zork & Moye's, S. I. will start work January 1 on \$60,000 addition to its reinforced concrete retail and wholesale store on San Francisco and El Paso streets, making a solid block of concrete structures.

The new section of the big building will give the concern 40,000 square feet more in floor space, including three stories and a basement. It will mark another step forward after five years in the present structure, into which the firm moved from smaller quarters to care for an increasing business.

Have Big Show Room. "We shall make the second floor a big show room, cut up into many departments," said Julius A. Krakauer. "We shall install a passenger elevator to carry people to it, besides a freight elevator to care for the business end of the new addition."

Plans Being Prepared. "The new part of our building will be of reinforced concrete, to match the present, will be equipped with automatic sprinklers and the trolley system for transporting goods, as already in use in the present structure. Plans Being Prepared. "We shall install a hardware display sample room in the new section which will rival any in the southwest, and allow us latitude in which to lay in new lines. The cost will be between \$50,000 and \$60,000, and building operations are to be begun by the first of the new year. The plans are being completed, and Trost & Trost are our architects."

Gus Zork, president of Krakauer, Zork & Moye's, bought a business site at the corner of Kansas and Texas streets this week at a cost of \$80,000 and will erect a five or six story reinforced concrete building on that site, when the present lease expires. This site is on the northeast corner of these street intersections and has a front-

ing of 78 feet on Texas street and 120 feet on Kansas street. It was bought from F. C. Spence, Colloft Bros, also bought the opposite corner of Texas and Kansas streets from John Sorenson for \$47,500. James L. Marr & Co., closed both of these deals.

\$15,000 Warehouse. The Perry-Kirkpatrick Realty company has started construction of a \$15,000 brick warehouse on South Florence street, between Sixth and Seventh streets. The building is to be one-story in height, and will cover an area 120x150 feet. Alongside the warehouse are to be two Mexican tenement houses each 24x120 feet, to cost together \$19,000.

Barns For Gen. Angeles. The company is also building some barns and other buildings at Gen. Angeles, on its farm four and one-half miles down the valley to cost about \$2000.

H. L. Mosley is building a \$5500 bungalow for E. E. Sherman on Gold street, between Elm and Piedras street, in Manhattan Heights.






