OPINION SAYS LAND BOUGHT UNDER 1913 MINERAL LAW CANNOT BE PROSPECTED

Austin, Tex., Dec. 6.—In construing the mineral law and the land law of 1913, the attorney general's department today, in an opinion to land commissioner Robison, held that lands purchased under the land law carry the mineral rights with them, and that such lands are subject to prospecting.

Under the mineral law of 1913 many tracts of land were sold under this law, classified as agriculture and grazing, and several persons have issued covering many of such tracts. Recently the commissioner of the general land office has received many requests for the leasing of the mineral rights on such land, as it was found much of the land contained minerals.

FATHER OF MRS. GUTHRIE'S DEAD

"Uncle Gid" Guthrie, Popular Figure in Southwestern Life, Dies Suddenly.

Alpine, Texas, Dec. 6.—S. R. Guthrie, a prominent ranchman of Alpine, aged 70 years, died suddenly at his ranch near Alpine this morning. Mr. Guthrie was the father of Mrs. W. W. Turney of El Paso. His wife and daughter survive him.

Mr. Guthrie was a native Texan, having been born near Gonzales. He had lived near Alpine for the past 30 years and was a pioneer ranchman of this section of the southwest. He was affectionately known among his friends and the people generally as "Uncle Gid." He located here just after the arrival of the railroads through this part of the country and his fund of stories and reminiscences of the early days of the trail was large and interesting.

SISTER BREAKS NECK WHILE NURSING BROTHER; SHOCK CAUSE OF BROTHER'S DEATH

Epitacia Leon Bustillos, a Mexican woman 45 years old, while nursing her brother, Vincente Leon Bustillos, at their home in room four at Eighth and Park streets, fell to the floor with a stroke of epilepsy and broke her neck. The brother, who was recovering from a severe case of typhoid fever, met with such a shock at the information that his sister was dead that he died a few hours later.

To "fix" the meters so they would register fast, the devices would have to be taken apart. Orders would have to come from headquarters through clerks, superintendents, foreman and others to the workmen. At least a dozen employes would know about it. The arrangement would involve a secret conspiracy, and would place the company at the absolute mercy of a constantly increasing group of men. No business organization with an ounce of brains would attempt anything so foolish. The workmen certainly would not tamper with meters on their account, for they would gain nothing by it, and would be dismissed if found out. The truth is that no gas company dares to "fix" its meters to run fast, even if it wanted to.
