Chief Executive is Warmly Received on Arriving to Deliver Addresses.

Columbus, O., Dec. 10.—President Wilson arrived here today to deliver two addresses and attend a public reception in the rotunda of the state capital.

TWO BATTLESHIP CONTRACTS LET

United States Government Begins Its Plans For a Greater Navy.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 9.—Secretary Daniels announced today that contracts for the construction of the battleships No. 43 and 44, authorized by the last congress, had been awarded to the New York and Mare Island navy yards, respectively.

The bids were New York, \$7,500,925; Mare Island, \$7,412,156. The decision to build the ships in the government yards was reached at a conference between president Wilson and secretary of the navy Daniels in the latter's office.

Columbus suffragets sent the president a large bouquet of roses after he arrived at his hotel. With the roses was a card saying the suffragets supported the Susan B. Anthony constitutional amendment providing for nation wide suffrage.

Soon after his arrival the clear, cold weather enticed the president and he walked through the business streets, accompanied by secret service men.

Coffin Buried at His Heels. The president walked about three miles, accompanied by Dr. Grayson, secretary Tumulty, about 100 citizens and a Scotch collie which persisted in barking at his heels.

An 80 year old lady meeting the party recognized the executive, made a little bow and exclaimed: "Bless my soul; if it isn't the president!"

Eleven hundred men were present at the noon luncheon for the president, and 300 more had been turned away. The balconies were filled with women.

GEN. SALAZAR TO LAS CRUCES

Will be Guest of Gen. Mercado; Subpoenaed to Appear at Baca Trial.

Santa Fe, N. M., Dec. 10.—Before he left for Las Cruces with Gen. Salvador Mercado, his commander while in the field in northern Chihuahua, Gen. Jose Ynez Salazar, was served with a subpoena to appear in the federal court here on December 15 in the suit of the United States against Elfigo Baca et al. who are charged with conspiracy to obtain Salazar's release from the Albuquerque jail.

Salazar was acquitted Thursday morning by a jury in the federal court of the charge of perjury in connection with his statements in a habeas corpus hearing at Santa Fe in 1911. Later he escaped from the jail in Albuquerque made his way to Mexico and was again recaptured near Columbus, N. M., and returned here to answer the perjury charge on which he was being held when he escaped.

Salazar expects to visit with Gen. Mercado for several days and will then locate some place in New Mexico with his family. He is said to be without funds.

LINDSEY SAYS LOVE IS BETTER THAN WAR FORCE

New York, Dec. 9.—A wireless message from the steamer Oscar II, signed and prepaid by Henry Ford, was received here today. The message gave a summary of a speech delivered on board Wednesday night by Judge Ben B. Lindsey of Denver, Colo., in which he declared the spirit of love would be more effective in international politics than military force.

Judge Lindsey told the peace advocates of his experience during 16 years on the bench, drawing the conclusion that criminals respond more quickly to trust than to shackles and force. He argued against the "preparatory police," basing part of his contention on the assertion that firearms are unknown in the reform prison camps in Colorado, except when they are needed to protect the convicts from persons living near the camps.

Money in Treasury. The treasurer's report showed that the department had in the treasury \$175,000 and a total of \$727,500 on deposit, \$175,000 of which had been paid in during 1915. A motion was carried that \$500 of this amount be allowed as savings account so that it might draw interest.

Taft Would Abolish Postmasters. Chicago, Ill., Dec. 10.—William Howard Taft, in an address here Thursday night, suggested the abolition of one great crop of political plums, namely, postmasters. He added that the national government could save \$4,000,000 a year by doing away with them and paying only the assistant postmasters, who do most of the work.
