Plant Of El Paso Lime Co. Near Walls Well Partially Destroyed.

EXPLOSION OCCURS ON TUESDAY NIGHT Big Kiln Must Be Rebuilt; Four Feet Of Fuse Is Found Near Building.

DYNAMITE was exploded under the big brick and concrete lime kiln of the El Paso Lime company Tuesday night, wrecking the foundation and blowing a hole 3 1/2 feet in diameter in the big kiln.
