ATTORNEY OUTLINES CASE AGAINST BACA

Santa Fe, N. Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 15.—The discovery of a cache of explosives and other inflammable material, piled on the floor of a liquor store under a lodging house where 60 persons were sleeping, raised the arrest of three men, one of whom the police afterwards declared made a full statement concerning an arson plot. The men under arrest are Michael Crowe, said to be a former Omaha politician; Joseph Landers, a wrestler, and F. E. Hartman, proprietor of the liquor store. Crowe was grilled for three hours by the police and made the statement which, according to officers, implicated the other two in a scheme to procure \$10,000 insurance money.

EMERGENCY REVENUE LAW IS TO BE MADE BASIS OF FIGHT

Washington, D. C., Dec. 15.—Treasury department estimates that receipts in 1916 will fall \$1,525,500 to meet disbursements including a \$1,900,000 postal deficit, are cited as the reasons why and means committee majority report on the emergency revenue law is being introduced in congress today. It is estimated that extension of the law until December 31, 1916, would provide \$900,000 more. Revenue from distilled spirits, fermented liquors and tobacco decreased \$35,000,000 in the last fiscal year, the report says. Treasury estimates of internal revenue receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1916, are \$2,700,000, compared with \$2,329,760 last year, "thus indicating a further anticipated revenue reduction, from this source, of more than \$11,000,000." The bill today was reported back to the house favorably with a view to considering the question. House leaders have requested all members to be present tomorrow in anticipation of a lively party fight.

LURES GIRL INTO BOAT, KILLS HER; WOUNDS HIMSELF
