CONSUL REPORTS ON JAP SHIP CASE

The petition alleges default of payment of interest on bonds. The hearing was set for January 31.

BULGARIA MAY WADE GREECE
London, Eng., Dec. 27.—Conflicting reports continue to reach London from the near eastern campaign.
Statements from some sources make it appear that the Teutonic allies are preparing steadily for an offensive movement in Greece in conjunction with the Bulgarians and Turkish forces.

50 U. S. DEPUTIES GO TO CLIFTON DISTRICT
Tucson, Ariz., Dec. 27.—United States marshal Joe Dillon and 50 deputies left Sunday for the Clifton mine strike district to post throughout the district notices of the order issued by United States district judge W. H. Sawtelle, Saturday restraining the Western Federation of Miners and its local unions from interference with the assessment work desired to be performed by the Morenci Copper company.
