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1915 BUILDING BREAKS RECORD

More Than \$3,583,667 in Permits Issued; First Rank in Entire State.

With building figures for the year amounting to approximately \$3,583,667, El Paso has broken all previous building records for the city and has taken first rank among the cities of Texas.

Up to noon Thursday the year's business was \$2,311,667. Before closing the books the American Construction company had taken out a permit for \$272,000 for the completion of the new \$500,000 high school, bringing the total to nearly \$2,600,000.

The previous record was made in 1912 when permits were issued for \$2,175,323. The increase of 1915 over that year was therefore \$1,358,324. In 1914 the business amounted to \$1,921,287, or \$1,659,250 under the present year.

Besides being the greatest year in the matter of large construction work, the year 1915 has seen more home building than ever before. Much of the latter class of work has been in additions located just outside the city limits, so that the figures of building do not represent by many thousands of dollars the actual construction work of the city.

Within the city the largest work undertaken during the year was the new county courthouse. The permit issued to J. E. Morgan placed the estimated cost of the work at \$428,000. Early in the year a permit was issued to Morgan for the construction of the shell of the high school amounting to \$111,000, and Thursday afternoon a permit for \$210,000 for the completion of the structure was issued.

The record of the last six years is as follows: 1910, \$1,352,567; approximately 1911, \$1,324,287; 1912, \$1,444,261; 1913, \$2,175,323; 1914, \$1,921,287; 1915, \$3,583,667.

Yunnan Attempts To Halt Rebels. Peking, China, Dec. 29.—President Yuan Shi Kai issued a mandate today ordering the military governors of the provinces adjacent to Yunnan to dispatch troops to suppress the revolution.

The French consul at Mong-Tze telegraphed Alexander County, French mission at Peking today that foreigners and foreign owned property in Yunnan province had not been molested up to Tuesday.

The French government has declined to permit movement of Chinese troops over the French-owned railway from Lien-Chau to the city of Yunnan. The revolutionists have protested against such use of the railroad and it is feared that if permission were granted the rebels would destroy the railway and attack foreigners.

Salvation Army Headquarters in Butte Wrecked by Dynamite Explosion.

Butte, Mont., Dec. 29.—The headquarters of the local branch of the Salvation Army were damaged early today by an explosion of dynamite. The explosive blew out the entire front store of the building and shattered glass in a hotel and a number of stores across the street.

Large boxes of Christmas toys and other materials given the army by department stores for the Christmas celebration to be held tomorrow night, were blown into the street.

Adjutant L. A. Reno, in charge of the work here, said he had no theory to offer in explanation of the explosion.
