Mrs. Asquith has also been interested in the case of Mrs. Savile, wife of the rector of Beverly, Yorkshire, and the daughter of count Hippolyt von Bothmer and his English wife. Mrs. Savile has been singled out for anti-German frenzy because her brother, Maj. count von Bothmer, and her cousin, Gen. Felix von Bothmer, are prominent in the German army. She was accused before the police of being a spy. The name of the informer was withheld, but with her eldest daughter, she was ordered to leave her home on the seacoast. Mrs. Asquith's brother, Harold Tennant, under secretary of state for war, thereupon offered to give them both employment at the war office in order that they might maintain themselves. For this Mr. Tennant was questioned in the house of commons. He defended himself eloquently, declaring that the unfortunate Mrs. Savile had been in England since she was 4 years old and was completely with the allies in sympathy. Esterlina Barefoot Dancer.
