NO SPECIAL MEETING OF BISHOPS HELD AND EPISCOPALians REJOICE

Some of the Bishops Declined to Attend and no Quorum Could Be Obtained; Now Plans Are Being Made for Attending Panama Conference; Movies to Figure in Discussions of the Methodist Conference.

EVERYWHERE Episcopal church leaders are saying they breathe freer since they know there is to be no special meeting of their house of bishops. Such a meeting was to have been held in Philadelphia, but a sufficient number of bishops declined to attend to insure a quorum.

FEDERAL COUNCIL WILL ISSUE FIRST YEAR BOOK The federal council of churches will issue, for the first of its kind, a year book of religious statistics of the United States. It is to be edited by Rev. Dr. Henry K. Carroll, a one time census commissioner of churches, and now the Washington representative of the religious bodies having memberships in the council and in the home missions council.
