IF WE fail to see to it that the 22,000,000 of persons in this country foreign born or of foreign parentage are Americans in language, in loyalty, in citizenship and in manner of life, I firmly believe we shall have lost our one great opportunity to determine the destiny of this republic, to make it not an aggregation of peoples but one nation united by common ideals against enemies without and within.

When we enlarge our army and navy we shall have taken only the first and most obvious steps for our national defense. I am glad that we have citizens' organizations to point the way in this. But we shall have utterly failed unless we organize the industrial and social forces of America to back up our military preparedness. Beyond all this there is the organization of the reserve that makes armies and navies and transportation lines and factories and mines effective national agents.

Says Children of Slums Are More Healthy Than Those Of the Country

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ARMY BILLS ARE BEING DRAFTED

Compromise Between House and Senate Measures is Likely to Be Effected.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 22.—The army's part in the national defense legislation began to take definite form in congressional committee today. With the house military committee in practical agreement on the outline of the army bill, chairman Hay was at work completing the rough draft. Meanwhile, the senate military committee was framing its measure for a thorough reorganization of the regular army with a peace strength of over 150,000 men.

While the committee was busy with this plan, the senate military committee was working on its proposals for the regular army, framing its measure on the basis of the Garrison bill which provides for an army of approximately 200,000 men on the basis of the war college plan of 1912. It is understood, the committee plans to make its bill authorize a thorough reorganization of the army with a peace strength of from 150,000 to 200,000 men.

To train the national guard, to supply sufficient officers for instructors at all military schools where a sufficient body of cadets is under instruction to warrant it, and to meet countless other demands on the commissioned personnel of the regular army, the house bill will add 756 officers, bringing the total up to 7900, as proposed by the war department in the Garrison plan. It also will provide for an increase in the medical corps and the medical reserve corps, and for the detaching of three army officers for duty with the American Red Cross.

The enlistment period for the regular army will be fixed at seven years, probably divided into four years with the colors and three in reserve. Provision will be made, however, for the discharge of efficient men into the reserve with less than four years service.
