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Belgium German Governor Warns Cardinal to Avoid Incendiary Writings.

London, Eng., March 20.—Gov. Gen. von Bissing has addressed a letter to cardinal Merle regarding the latter's Lenten pastoral, says a dispatch to Reuter's from Amsterdam. In his letter, as published, Gen. von Bissing says: "There can, of course, be no doubt I never prevent your eminence from communicating to your flock whatever the holy father wishes them to know through you; but besides this, your eminence in pastoral letters, indulgent in political statements against which I decidedly protest. "By such arbitrariness you cause among a credulous people noxious excitement and induce them to oppose the administrative work of those who occupy the country."

French Warship Is Torpedoed

Berlin, Germany, March 20.—(By Wire) to Sayville, L. I.—An official Austrian statement says that a French destroyer of the Zouche type has been torpedoed by an Austrian submarine. Official announcement was made in Paris yesterday that the French destroyer Renaudin had been sunk in the Atlantic by a submarine with the loss of 47 men. The Renaudin belonged to the same class as the Fouché.

Miners Crushed 200 Feet Down

Santa Fe, N. M., March 20.—Ricardo Lugo and Manuel Lopez, miners in the Waldo mine at Kelly, N. M., were found crushed to death under a heavy chute Sunday, 200 feet under ground. Their necks were broken and skulls caved in.

Supreme Court Warns All Railroad Men to Apply "Safety First"

Washington, D. C., March 20.—In a "safety first" decision today the supreme court warned all railroad men of their responsibilities to the public. It reversed a damage award to the estate of a brakeman on the Great Northern, who was killed in rear-end collision with a freight train. "His fate gives no cause for blame," said the court, "but we cannot help pointing out that the tragedy of the collision might have been avoided. How imperative his duty was to manifest to his fellow men in any way would cast innumerable liability upon railroads, and what is of greater concern, remove security from the lives of those who travel upon them and, therefore, all who are concerned with their operation, should have a full and anxious sense of responsibility."

\$775 Is Minimum Wage On Which An American Can Support a Family

More Troops Reach Columbus, Seven Troop Trains En Route

Passengers on the incoming Golden State limited train Tuesday from Columbus state that the first section of the Second cavalry from Fort Ethan Allen, Vermont, arrived in Columbus Tuesday before midnight, and that seven trains are scheduled to arrive, bearing the remainder of the Second cavalry and the Fifth cavalry, which is divided between Fort Myer, Va., Fort Sheridan, Ill., and Fort Leavenworth, Kan.

Austrians Renew Assault And Take 283 Prisoners

Berlin, Germany, March 20.—By Wire) to Sayville, L. I.—Austro-Hungarian troops continue their successful attacks on the Italian front at the Tolmezzo bridgehead and have driven the Italians from fortified positions south of Erledy, capturing 283 prisoners, according to an Austrian official statement under Sunday's date, received here today.

50 AIRPLANES FIGHT BATTLE

Conflict at Mulhausen Is Called Piercest Aerial Fight of the War.

Basel, Switzerland, March 20.—When 55 allied airplanes rained Mulhausen, upper Alsace, the greatest aerial battle of the war took place. Accounts just reaching here declare more than 50 machines were fighting at such close quarters that the German anti-aircraft guns had to cease firing in order to avoid hitting their own machines. One French airplane rammed a German machine, which fell in flames. Five German airplanes and three French fell, the occupants of all being killed. Even while the allied planes were fighting, they dropped a number of bombs upon military positions. Many thousands of persons witnessed the combat. The allied air raid on Mulhausen was reported in Sunday's French official statement.

Would Suppress Unofficial News

Albuquerque, N. M., March 20.—In response to telegraphic requests from Maj. Gen. Finney and Maj. W. E. Sample, commandant at Columbus, the federal district attorney's office here is distributing to New Mexico newspapers an appeal to avoid publication of unofficial dispatches on the border situation. The district attorney's letter states that dispatches sent out already have embarrassed the military through giving "Villa agents" information they could not get otherwise and condemn several correspondents for filing elsewhere matter censored at Columbus. A warning in the appeal states that improper publications can be punished and a plea, in the name of patriotism, to suppress unauthorized military information are included.

Oliver Creech Dies in Phoenix

Phoenix, Ariz., March 20.—As a result of blood poisoning, which set in after he was wounded in the thigh by a bullet from a revolver in the hands of his brother, Cecil Creech, Oliver Creech, who drove in the 1914 Phoenix race in 1914, died this morning. Both brothers claimed the shooting was an accident.

Bryan Is Called Liar In Clash With Nebraska

Lincoln, Neb., March 20.—A wordy dispute between Wm. J. Bryan and John C. Maher, a local politician, in which the latter was named by Mr. Bryan in a hotel lobby, culminated in the industrial meetings previous to the prohibition mass meeting here tonight, to mark the opening of the state campaign. The dispute arose over a question of Mr. Maher as to whether one of the speakers from the east who is on the program for an address was getting paid for his services. Mr. Bryan intimated the remark that Maher's motives were mercenary. This provoked the report and Mr. Maher followed it up with other charges.

Shot Disperses Mexicans Crawling to Pecos Bridge

Del Rio, Texas, March 20.—Firing of several shots at Highbridge, 60 miles from here, last night, caused residents of that section to telegraph to the United States army patrol division here for reinforcements. Investigation showed that a group of Mexicans detected in crawling up the Pecos bridge on the Southern Pacific, had been firing upon a sentry after his challenge to halt had been disregarded. The men disappeared without anyone having been injured. The guard at the bridge was strengthened recently.

Special Trains of Airplanes and Ammunition Go West

Sixteen cars of ammunition, 10 cars filled with airplanes and two of airplane parts, went through El Paso Monday for Columbus and to Mexico. The ammunition was made up into one train, the airplanes made another train with the extra parts attached to the airplane special. The trains were ordered to proceed through El Paso without stop and the airplanes are now being set up for flight into Mexico.

French Troops Seize Towns From Bulgarians

London, Eng., March 20.—A strong French column with light artillery from the Saloniki entrenched camp has attacked and occupied the villages of Maritovo, Karadzah, and Kousna, which had been entered by Teuton and Bulgarian forces, according to a Reuter dispatch from Saloniki dated Monday. The French had only a few casualties.

Lambs Reach Top Price; \$11.35 Is Paid

Kansas City, Mo., March 20.—The highest price ever paid for fed lambs was recorded on the local market today when Colorado offerings brought \$11.35. Twelve hundred Colorado cuts were received here, which is said by the stockyard officials to be the largest number ever received in one day.

San Francisco, Cal., March 20.—The arrest of four men, two in San Francisco and two in Seattle, Wash., and the seizure here of a complete plant for the manufacture of counterfeit \$5 federal reserve bank bills, secret service men today, in the terminating of a long search for the source of dangerous counterfeit money circulated freely along the Pacific coast.

Austrian Hospital Ship Torpedoed Without Warning

Berlin, Germany, March 20.—(By Wire) to Sayville, L. I.—The official account of the Austrian admiralty of the torpedoing of the Austro-Hungarian hospital ship Elektra, was received today from Vienna as follows: "The Elektra was torpedoed on March 18 by an enemy submarine. No warning was given. One sailor was drowned and two Red Cross nurses were badly wounded. "It is impossible to imagine a more gross violation of international law."
