

SEVEN STORY BUILDING STARTED; NEW APARTMENT TO COST \$50,000

Roberts-Banner Building Will Complete Solid Block of Big Buildings on Stanton; Mrs. Patterson to Build Five-Story Apartment on Mesa; Japanese Bungalow Planned for Mesa Ave.; Other Buildings.

GROUND was broken during the present week for the new Roberts-Banner building which will rise seven stories at the southwest corner of Stanton and Mills streets and cost \$185,000 completed. The contract for the construction of the building was awarded to John Mulligan last Saturday at approximately \$17,500.

The new building will have a frontage of 80 feet on Mills street and 112 on Stanton street. Its completion will convert the west side of Stanton street into a solid row of high buildings, including Everybody's which is to be heightened two stories, the four story Lanier building and the seven story Roberts-Banner building.

Five story apartment. Announcement was also made during the present week of the completion of plans for the five story apartment house to be built for Mrs. Mildred Patterson on the southwest corner of Mesa avenue and California streets, which will cost, with furnishing, \$50,000. It was announced at the same time the probability that a little later an addition of equal size would be built that would bring the total cost to \$100,000. This building will have an automatic elevator. H. M. Bentall is the architect.

Store and Tenement. Work is just starting on the store and tenement house of Vincent Salcini at Third and Stanton streets, to cost \$18,000. This building will be 7x120 feet, two stories in height, with stores on the first floor and apartments and rooms above.

Work is under way on a \$1000 apartment building for H. A. Nookle on the west side of Stanton street, between Main and Cliff streets. The structure will be two stories in height and contain two three room apartments and one five room apartment. A basement will be provided and heating plant installed. The Phoenix-El Paso Building company has the contract for the work.

Japanese Bungalow. The Phoenix-El Paso Building company has started construction work on a seven room Japanese bungalow for Mrs. Ada Shelton on the west side of Mesa avenue between Curri and Hague streets.

The Anderson-Filler Improvement company has sold to D. J. Cooke a modern four room bungalow at Clifton and Lamar streets, in Government Hill, the consideration being \$2300.

New K. Z. & M. Warehouse. Plans will be ready next week for inviting proposals for the new warehouse of Krakauer, Zork & More, to be located on the west side of El Paso street, between San Francisco and Main streets, adjoining the present buildings of the company. The warehouse will be four stories in height, will cover an area 90x100 feet, and will cost about \$5000. Trost & Trost are the architects.

Trost & Trost are drawing plans for a five room bungalow for Ralph Converse to be located in Government Hill. The house will cost about \$4000.

LIENS AGAINST STATE LANDS MUST BE PAID WHEN SOLD. Phoenix, Ariz., March 25.—All liens existing against state lands when they are sold must be paid by the state. The attorney general has so informed the land department in passing upon a case that arose within the Tempe drainage district.

Three citizens bought land within the drainage district, which recently sold a bond issue. No clear understanding was had about the payment of the share of the bond interest and sinking fund assessed against the state land, and the directors of the district presented a bill to the department. Attorney general Wiley Jones decided that anything that was due when title to the land was passed must be paid by the state, but the purchasers must meet all future payments.



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
