DOUGLAS GENERAL IS ARRESTED

Villa's Understudy Found in North El Paso Street House; Was Killer.

Pablo Saenz, known as the "boy general" of the Villa, was arrested in a house on North El Paso street Thursday night by police officers and provost guards and placed in the city jail.

He is about 24 years old, is a slender, boyish looking Mexican with one side of his face disfigured, where he says a bullet struck him when a small boy, Saenz is said to have participated in a number of killings in Mexico during the Villa reign of terror.

Saenz came to El Paso after the transfer of the Juarez garrison from the Villa crowd to the Carranza government but could not be located. Information was given the police Thursday evening that he was at the rooming house on North El Paso and the place was surrounded by police and provost guards and Saenz arrested.

May Be Deported. Saenz is said to have 200 or more sheep and a number of head of cattle in the Juarez valley which Carranza consul Andres Garcia says will be confiscated by the Carranza officials in Juarez. He may be deported to Juarez.

The raid on the house was made under the direction of Capt. W. B. Greer, of the police department. Sergeant Young, of the provost guards, Jesus Ontiveros, said to have been a Villa general, was arrested Friday morning and is being held pending an investigation of his recent activities.

Aero Dispatch Line Discontinued; Planes Scout For Villistas

Columbus, N. M., April 7.—The army aero dispatch line from Columbus to the advanced chain of field bases has been discontinued temporarily, because of the impracticality of flying planes in searching the cliffs and crags of Guerrero for bandits, according to reports reaching here today. All of the planes are now operating in the San Antonio district where Gen. Pershing has announced they are invaluable for scouting purposes.

It was asserted today that the dispatch line will probably be resumed with the arrival of the eight new planes, which have been ordered to the expeditionary corps.

TWO BANDITS KILLED AT SATEVO, MEXICO

through San Antonio towards the south. Battle Report Reaches Washington. Washington, D. C., April 7.—Another engagement between Carranza troops and Villa bandits took place April 4 at Cieneguillas. Ten of the bandits were killed. This information was received at the war department today.

No Withdrawal Order. Persistent reports that the American forces in Mexico might be recalled soon are emphatically denied by secretaries Lansing and Baker.

Both declared there is no present intention of changing the orders given to Gen. Funston shortly after the Columbus, N. M., raid, to "get Villa, dead or alive."

Letcher Reports On Clashes. American consul Letcher, at Chihuahua, in a dispatch received at the war department today through Maj. Gen. Funston, told of some of the results of the clashes between American troops and Villa forces at Aguanacatlan on April 1, and the fight between the bandits and Carranza troops near Cieneguillas three days later.

Letcher reported a persistent rumor in Chihuahua that Villa had been wounded. He said the fight at Aguanacatlan resulted in the killing of 20 or 40 bandits by troops of the Tenth cavalry, under Col. Brown.

Mine Company Aide Troops. Brown's troops were reported as living for two weeks on beef and corn with supplies almost exhausted. A mining company, Letcher said, had relieved the shortage by sending a special train with supplies and forage.

Carranzistas. At the fight of Cieneguillas the Carranza forces under Gen. Cavazos captured two bandits. Letcher reported the Carranza troops were cooperating with Gen. Pershing and that Gen. Gutierrez had informed the American authorities of the Carranza troop disposition about Chihuahua.

Quiet At Monterey, Torreon. A resume of a telegram dated April 6 from the American consul general at Monterey made public by the state department today said:

Telegraphic and mail reports from Torreon and Durango indicate a marked improvement since the arrival of Gen. Facinto Trevino at Torreon and the establishment of his headquarters there. Monterey is quiet and all interior consulates report good order and friendly feeling toward Americans.

Report From Garcia. The Mexican embassy announced receipt of a telegram forwarded by consul Garcia at El Paso from Gen. Gutierrez saying the Villa bandits had been met and practically annihilated by the federal government's forces. The report added that Villa himself was wounded and his capture was imminent. No further details were given. The date of the fight mentioned was not reported.

MEXICAN PLEADS GUILTY TO ATTACK ON AMERICANS

Lockhart, Tex., April 7.—Leon Gonzalez, one of four Mexicans charged with attempting to murder the Wilkie family at Fort Bliss, last summer, pleaded guilty in district court here Thursday and, like the other three men, was sentenced to 20 years imprisonment.

The attack on the Wilkie family created much excitement because it was supposed to have been the work of Mexican bandits who then were very active on the lower border.

CARRANZA MONEY ADVANCE AIDS CONDITIONS IN TORREON. Torreon, Mex., April 7.—All is quiet in Torreon and the advance in value of the de facto government currency is greatly aiding the economic situation. No more has been heard of the special commission, which went to arrange terms for the surrender of Gen. Canuto Reyes and several other Villa leaders under an amnesty grant.
